# **Neatherd Knights**

#### Who are the Neatherd Knights?

The Neatherd Knights are here to support Year 7, 8 and 9 pupils at school. We are a trained pupil team who are here to listen to other pupils' concerns and worries. Our aim is to ensure that all pupils have a safe place to grow and

develop within our community. We strive to make sure all pupils have someone to talk to and someone who they can relate to or who has – relatively recently – had similar experiences. We understand that sometimes pupils may not feel comfortable speaking with an adult. The Neatherd Knights can help with anything from worries about a lost planner to complex friendship issues. We are here to support pupils, no matter the problem.



#### How do we work?

When a pupil comes to us with a concern, we fill out a form detailing the incident and naming those involved, then we discuss (with the pupil) how to proceed. This may involve resolving the issue directly with another party or putting other measures in place. After the incident has been addressed, we pass the form on to the Student Development Team, who record it on a database so that we can spot recurring issues. We understand that every situation is unique, and will deal with each one in the manner we feel is best. We cannot stress too much the importance of speaking out to help others or yourself, as no matter how minor the problem might seem, every attempt will be made to ensure you feel happier and safer at school.

#### Where can you find us?


At the moment our 'castle' is in Society and Ethics 1 (opposite the Student Development office). There will be a Knight in S&E1 from 0830-0840, at break and during lunch every day. We can also be identified by our red ties or Neatherd Knight badges (and yellow polo shirts in the summer). We hope that we can be a friendly face whether you come to see us in the castle or out and about around school.

We want every pupil to have a place where they can share their feelings without judgement or fear. If you or anyone you know is having problems in school, feel free to speak to us.

We hope you don't need us, but if you do, we are here to help!

# Services Pupil Premium pupils and the Bronze Armed Forces Covenant Award

We currently have 36 Services Pupil Premium pupils (SPP) at Neatherd. These are pupils that have a parent (or parents) serving in the Armed Forces or have served in the Armed Forces. We offer various systems of support. These can consist of a check-in with every single SPP pupil in the school; questionnaires and letters of introduction to every services parent, to ascertain what support they think the school should provide; or a lunch-time drop-in session every Monday. This session is particularly important as it offers an opportunity for Services pupils to meet up, bring their friends and partake in a range of activities, all within in a nurturing environment.

At the end of last year we were thrilled to be awarded the Bronze Armed Covenant award, which recognises the support Neatherd provides for SPP pupils and their families and also highlights how proud Neatherd is to be involved with the Armed Forces community. # A short story by Baileigh, Year 8


#### The Room

# **Top Tips for Revision!**

With GCSEs around the corner, here are my personal top tips for pupils on the best way to revise. Everyone has things that may work for them but these are some great bits of general advice that should help all to make the most of their revision time.

- 1. Plan to revise Have a revision timetable and stick to it! Plan in rest breaks and make sure you still keep up with any hobbies or clubs you may have. Make it realistic, as the more it fits within what you can do the more likely you are to stick to it.
- Little and often Big revision sessions are less effective.
   Make sure you plan around 30-minute chunks per subject across the week. You can always add more or less for subjects you need to focus on.
- 3. Mark out your space Have an area for revision. Clear the space around you and make sure it is free from disruption. Try to avoid things that might take away your focus such as background music, TV, computers and your phone. If it's going to be revision, make this the focus.



- 4. **Have breaks and drink!** Water is shown to be effective at boosting the brain so make sure you have some to hand. Small 5-minute breaks, every 30 minutes, help you to absorb the current revision and then refocus on the next subject or topic at hand.
- 5. **Revise, Test, Test** Our brains act like a sieve. They decide what's important enough to keep and what to forget. The more we use some knowledge or information the stronger the memory becomes. To this end, recapping knowledge through testing is important. Go back to things you have revised previously and try to recall this knowledge through practice.
- 6. **Decide what works best** Everyone revises differently... some of us like videos, others flashcards or revision guides. Sometimes test papers can help and often the "look, say, cover, write, check" approach works. Whatever it is, have a process and don't be afraid to try something new! Videos may seem good but we remember far more of what we write down, so always make some notes!

I hope this helps and please do start now! Little and often over time is far better than cramming and will certainly help to ensure you get the grade you deserve. Best wishes and good luck!

#### **Careers Work at Neatherd**

At Neatherd, we take great pride in our Careers work and are one of the only schools in Norfolk to have been awarded with the prestigious Gold Career Mark for outstanding careers provision.



Our programme of activities is organised for all year groups, from our popular Year 7 Business Breakfast to the Year 11 mock interviews. We are very lucky that many local employers and organisations come in to support our events and therefore give our pupils an insight into the world of work. Other regular careers events include the Apprenticeship Afternoon for Year 9 & 10, the Year 10 work experience week, the Post-16 Options Evening plus many special assemblies.

From September to November most, of the Year 11 assemblies had a focus on Careers and Post-16 options and, in the near future, our KS4 pupils will hear speakers from the Army and the construction sector. Pupils in Year 8/9 will soon have assemblies on apprenticeships and "Women in the Gaming Industry".



Careers education isn't only delivered through our events however, but also fully embedded in the curriculum.

This is very much an ongoing task but we currently having a number of subject ambassadors working on this. Our Society & Ethics team deliver an excellent set of careers-specific lessons and this is supported by each tutor group having a half-term worth of careers lessons each academic year.

We are lucky to have an experienced and knowledgeable team of specialised careers staff at Neatherd, headed up by our Careers Leader Mr Hodges and overseen by Mr Humphreys, our interim Deputy Headteacher. Mrs Broughton is our full-time Careers Adviser/Careers Coordinator and our Careers Adviser Mrs O'Connor also works at school on a part-time basis. Careers Advice is routinely delivered on a 1:1 basis to all Year 10/Year 11 pupils and to pupils of other year groups as and when requested. It is important to note that any pupil or parent can request a careers appointment when required.



#### **National Careers Week**

National Careers Week takes place during w/c 6th March. At Neatherd we will be joining in with a variety of different lunchtime activities taking place and open to all pupils. On Monday 6th March the Army will be along with a team from the Royal Signals. We are also expecting visitors to represent the industry sectors of engineering, sports and many others.
