This year's school production was, in fact, two school productions. We decided to stage SIX the Musical (Teen Version) because we currently have very talented female actors and singers in school. SIX was the perfect vehicle to showcase what they can do. SIX has, naturally, six amazing roles with opportunities for backing singers and dancers; but what could the rest of our incredibly talented actors do - especially the boys?

We never turn anyone away from our shows - if you audition, you're in! Staying the course of the gruelling rehearsal schedule is another matter, but we usually audition and accept around 90 students with an eventual cast of around 75. With a maximum cast of 20 for SIX, this meant that we'd either have around 70 very disappointed actors or a mutiny on our hands! The answer was simple, we had to come up with another show to stage in a double bill alongside SIX. But what?






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SIX runs at 1 hour 15 mins so we knew that we could put on another show of around the same running time. We also wanted to compliment SIX rather than just stage something random and unrelated. With not many short, Tudor-themed shows for a cast of around 70, we had no choice but to write something ourselves. This is how "A Tale of Two Lizzies" came about. At first we planned to focus on Henry VIII and started workshopping his story; but the more we improvised and researched, the more it became clear that Henry's children, Mary, Elizabeth and Edward were much more interesting.

To compliment the premise of SIX as a competition, we started exploring the lives of Elizabeth and Mary; especially the power-hungry, gold-digging men who featured in their lives. The show was a joy to put together, with ideas coming from students and staff alike: a take on Blind Date, trauma therapy with Mr Sigmund Freud, a whole host of executioners, William Shakespeare and four Queen Elizabeths!



Pupils had the opportunity to deepen their understanding of the castle's evolution over time and its significance as a historic site.

Our pupils were a credit to the school, showing enthusiasm, curiosity and very good behaviour throughout the day. Feedback from pupils highlighted how much they valued the handson learning experience and the chance to connect classroom learning to a real-world setting.

Mr Sinclair, Miss Stewart-Richardson and Miss Hensellek are committed to providing comprehensive guidance, resources, and support to help pupils navigate the complex landscape of higher education and employment opportunities.

JANUARY'S CAREER OF THE MONTH - TECHNICIAN

Chemical technicians conduct chemical and physical laboratory tests to assist scientists in research and development of new products and processes. Salaries for technicians in East of England can earn up to £33,373 a year.

Entry Requirements: A bachelor's degree in chemistry or biology is preferred for chemical technicians.

Your day-to-day will include tasks such as:

- Conduct chemical or physical laboratory tests to assist scientists in making qualitative or quantitative analyses of solids, liquids, or gaseous materials
- Operate experimental pilot plants, assisting with experimental design
- Order and inventory materials to maintain supplies
- Design or create experimental apparatus to develop new products or processes
- Maintain, clean, or sterilise laboratory instruments or equipment
- Set up and conduct chemical experiments, tests, and analyses, using techniques such as chromatography, spectroscopy, physical or chemical separation techniques, or microscopy
- Prepare chemical solutions for products or processes, following standardised formulas, or create experimental formulas

Skills required:

- Curious to learn new things and ask questions
- Resilient so you can stay positive and meet deadlines
- Enjoy working with other people in a team
- Organised as you may have to carry out tests as specific times

FEBRUARY'S CAREER OF THE MONTH - BAKER

Bakers prepare bread, cakes, and pastries to sell and serve in shops, cafes, or restaurants. Bakers can earn up to £24,912 a year.

Entry requirements: There are no specific entry requirements to become a baker. You may find it useful to have GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 (A* to C) or equivalent, in subjects like English, maths, science, or food technology. You could start out by doing a baking course at college, applying to be a trainee in a bakery, or doing a baking apprenticeship.



Your day-to-day tasks could include:

- Making sure you have enough supplies
- Measuring out large quantities of ingredients
- Working safely with machinery like power mixers, industrial ovens and production lines.
- Making dough
- Working out cooking times
- Keeping production areas clean
- Developing new products and recipes

Skills required:

- Practical skills
- Organisation / time management skills
- Creativity / innovation
- Numeracy skills
- Artistic skills
