Summer Uniform is here!



For many years now we have, after Easter, moved to our summer uniform which consists of pupils being permitted to wear a light blue (Neatherd Logo) polo shirt. These can be purchased from Birds of Dereham.

The polo shirt can be worn without the Neatherd tie and can be untucked. This is always a popular choice with our pupils and therefore we are still happy to continue with this as an option. However, in an attempt to reduce costs to families, we are also now happy to allow pupils to continue to wear their winter uniform button shirts without their tie. The shirt, however, would be required to be tucked in.

In all cases, the school blazer is required to be worn (except, of course, in very hot weather or when pupils have asked their teacher's permission to remove their blazer). Should pupils be feeling cold, they may also wear a school jumper. However, this is **in addition to** the blazer and not simply in place of the blazer. Pupils will also be expected to continue to wear skirts to the knee, full-length (non-skinny) trousers or tailored shorts. Last year, we saw some very warm weather and many pupils found tailored shorts preferable to fulllength trousers.

Attendance matters!

We often remind pupils that every minute of their learning time counts – they will never get it back again. And to learn, they need to be in school, in class and with their teacher. High attendance really does matter. 90% might sound like an excellent figure but even this is not high enough...

- 90% attendance is the equivalent of half a day's absence per week on average.
- Over five years of secondary school, this is equivalent to missing half a year of school.

Clearly, we cannot help being absent when we are extremely unwell. There are also times when it is vital that children do *not* come into school in order to avoid spreading infection to others, including when they have been vomiting or have had diarrhoea.

However, there are many times when pupils might feel a bit under the weather but could still – with a little effort – come into school. In fact, they often find that they start to feel better after a little while. If a pupil feels much worse as the day goes on, the school will always contact parents. **These are the times that make the biggest difference.** The odd day's absence here and there doesn't seem like a big deal, but it soon adds up and it means missed learning time and falling behind in studies.

As a rough guide, we would suggest that children SHOULD come to school if they are feeling unwell with the following:

- A minor cold
- Tiredness
- A headache
- A cough or sniffle (so long as it is not accompanied by a temperature)
- Tummy ache

If unsure, please do contact the Attendance Office and we will be pleased to give you advice and guidance. Our job is to support you in supporting your children.

At Neatherd, we are fortunate to have a large and experienced team of trained **Designated Safeguarding Leads** (DSLs) whose responsibility is to oversee all matters relating to child protection and wider safeguarding support. The team meets regularly to share key information, work together on resolving complex issues and provide professional challenge to one another. We also work extensively with a range of external agencies and partners including the Local Authority, other schools, medical professionals, the police, social workers, charities and mental health providers, to name but a few. If you have a concern about a child's safety and wellbeing, you should always feel free to raise it with a member of the Safeguarding Team – by phone, in person or by emailing office@neatherd.org and stating 'FAO Safeguarding Team' in the subject line - and it will be treated with the highest levels of urgency and importance.
