Message from the Headteacher



Welcome to our final school newsletter of 2023. As the term draws to a close, we have been taking time over the past week to celebrate our pupils' achievements through rewards assemblies and 'zero hero' celebration events, recognising their ongoing commitment to our school values of compassion, hard work, respect, integrity and fairness. This term alone, Neatherd pupils have been awarded over 360,000 house points and hundreds of Golden Tickets for their efforts in class. They are a superb bunch of young people and we are very proud of them. We also welcomed back our recent Year 11 Leavers for their GCSE certificate Presentation Evening on Tuesday 12th December. Alongside celebrating their exam success, it was a wonderful opportunity to catch up with them and to hear about how well they had settled into their college and sixth form courses and apprenticeships. These events are always a real privilege for us, as members of staff.

December is also a time for reflection as we look back over the events of the past twelve months. Working together as members of 'Team Neatherd,' we – pupils, staff and families – have accomplished a great deal to be proud of. 2023 started with the creation of our new Eco Committee and, through their hard work and dedication, its members were soon successful in achieving the Eco Schools Green Flag Award. Our actors, singers and dancers wowed their audiences in this year's school production of *Matilda* at Dereham Memorial Hall and, over recent weeks, they have been busy with their preparations for next February's production of *Peter Pan*. Our musicians' talents have shone at the summer and Christmas concerts, and we marvelled at the superb works of our young artists in this year's Art Exhibition. Our athletes have participated in more fixtures than ever before, with Year 7 netballers and Year 8 and Year 11 footballers being crowned league champions. Academically, our pupils achieved GCSE results that were above local and national averages and there has been success too in events such as the Junior UKMT maths challenge and the CyberFirst Girls Competition. The school's excellent provision has been rightly recognised through successful re-accreditation of the Career Mark Gold award and in becoming the first secondary school in Norfolk to achieve the Computing Quality Mark, and we are currently working hard on achieving re-accreditation for the ArtsMark. Pupils had great experiences at home and abroad as Activities Week returned for the first time since 2019. They have also enjoyed the pupil and staff inter-house competitions that have accompanied the relaunch of our house system and have shown real commitment to the wider community through their fundraising for Comic Relief and Children in Need. Here's to more success in 2024!

Author Visit

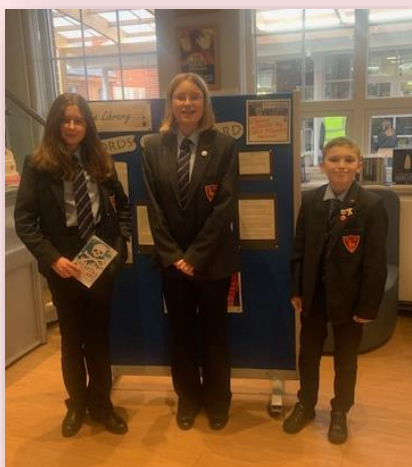
On Thursday 12th October, we welcomed David Farr, the author of two brilliant books for children – *The Book of Stolen Dreams* and *The Secret of the Blood-Red Key* – to Neatherd. David gave a wonderful presentation about his first book, describing the inspiration for his story as the journey his great aunt and uncle made when fleeing Nazi Germany in the 1930s, upon whom the characters Rachel and Robert are loosely based. They embark upon a journey during which they hope to learn how to save their country from a tyrannical self-proclaimed king. They also want to save their imprisoned father and many others wrongly taken into custody for standing up for the right things. It's an exciting page-turner which had been given to all Year 7 pupils to read over the summer. He also introduced his second book to them, offering a new quest for Robert and Rachel.



David then asked the pupils to get their own creative juices working by encouraging everyone to think about how they would start writing their own story – how to start with an exciting opening sentence from which a fabulous story follows! The pupils participated really well, and we're looking forward to reading what they write next. In giving the pupils some information about his career to date, David told them about his work as a screenwriter, theatre director and playwright before writing his first book for children. You may remember the BBC series, *The Night Manager*, which is one of David's many achievements.

Parent Information Evening about Mental Health and how we support pupils at Neatherd

On Wednesday 22nd November, Mr O'Brien (SENCO) and Mrs Emanuel (Mental Health Practitioner) held an information evening about mental health, which remains a huge issue in society and for our young people in schools. The aim was to do some work with our whole community to create a joint vision for supporting our pupils' mental health. At the information evening, the mental health policy and ethos was launched and parents were asked to give feedback.

Some of the questions raised were: ***What can parents do? What can the school do? What should we expect from external services? What responsibilities do the young people have themselves to create a school which is a positive place to talk about mental health?***

During the evening, parents also learnt about the mental health support we offer at Neatherd. Mrs Emanuel offers basic cognitive behaviour therapy using workbooks on anxiety, self-esteem, anger, self-harm and low mood. She also does regular check-ins with pupils as well as referring pupils to external agencies for support. This includes the MHST, JustOneNorfolk, Nelson's Journey, Cup-O-T and YESS (formerly Prospects). Other support in school includes SEMH (Social, Emotional and Mental Health) – this outlines classroom strategies, SEND team interventions and referrals to external agencies including EPSS, Respectrum, Paddy Venner, Kicks (NCFC), alternative provision and early help support. The Mental Health Support Team also attended the evening. They work closely with the school offering support to our pupils and supporting the school with our whole school approach. The Mental Health Support Team meet with pupils on a 1:1 basis and offer cognitive behaviour therapy on worry management, depression/low mood and anxiety.

The Eco-Committee have been busy creating more wildlife-friendly spaces around the school with help from the **Woodland Trust's Free Trees for Schools** initiative. The team worked to plant 105 saplings of rowan, hazel, hawthorn and silver birch to extending existing hedgerows as well as individual oak trees that will live for up to 600 years! This work will establish food sources and shelter for wildlife, supporting biodiversity around the school site.

CyberFirst Girls Competition November 2023

We entered two teams of 4 into the CyberFirst Girls competition 2023 and they both did fantastically well as teams with some stunning individual performances. Results are not yet published but we will provide updates as soon as they are released. Miss Skipper, formerly an engineer working for BT before joining the team at Neatherd, provided support for the girls and was a superb mentor for them, keeping them going when the challenges were tough. Her enthusiasm and motivation provided constant motivation throughout all those lunchtime sessions and into the evenings when the teams continued to work hard in their own time.

The CyberFirst Girls Competition, organized by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC), has become a significant event in promoting interest in technology and cybersecurity among young girls in the UK. In the 2023 edition of this competition, an impressive number of over 8,700 school children participated, with girls aged 12-13 tackling challenges in areas such as cryptography and artificial intelligence.

This competition is an excellent initiative by the UK government to encourage girls to consider careers in STEM subjects, particularly in cybersecurity. It is an effort to address the gender imbalance in the tech sector, where women currently constitute only about 22% of the workforce in the cybersecurity field. This is something that here at Neatherd we are working hard to address through the "I Belong" programme which is a national drive to get more girls studying GCSE computer science. An important project to fill the massive number of job vacancies in the tech industry.



We know the scores of the teams and, based on last year's results, we expect to come high up in the rankings. However, the overall impact of such competitions on participating schools and pupils is profoundly positive. Schools across many regions, including Norfolk and within our trust, have had teams winning regional finals and receiving invitations to prestigious prize-giving dinners, where they are recognized for their hard work and achievements. Teams winning any of the categories also get laptops for all team members.

The CyberFirst Girls Competition not only offers a platform for young girls to showcase their skills but also plays a crucial role in inspiring and educating the next generation of technology professionals. By participating in such events, pupils from schools like us gain invaluable experience and exposure to the world of cybersecurity, potentially paving the way for their future careers in this dynamic field. We will again be entering teams next year comprised of girls in years 8 and 9 so please watch out for the entry information in 2024.

Careers News

Career Mark Gold Award re-accreditation

Neatherd's Careers Team have been congratulated and recognised for their hard work and dedication in terms of the careers provision at school. In a recent assessment, their Career Mark Gold Award was re-accredited.



The process involved a virtual assessment with the Careers Leader at school, Mr Hodges, plus several different Focus Groups with pupils from Years 8-11. "The pupils were a credit to the school and were able to articulate eloquently their experiences of careers education across the school", says Mr Hodges. "This is a fantastic achievement and the report reflects that careers education is embedded across the whole of the school to ensure the best possible outcomes."

One of the main strengths of Neatherd's careers programme, highly valued by the learners, is its programme of visiting employers and speakers. This includes careers assemblies, the Post-16 Options Evening and the Year 11 mock interview days, as well as our Work Experience Week in Year 10.

Post-16 applications

All pupils in Year 11 should have applied for A-level and / or vocational college courses by now – ideally through the 'HelpYouChoose' website. The application deadlines for some local sixth forms has already passed; therefore it is most important that applications are completed as soon as possible. Those pupils who require any help or advice regarding their applications should speak to their form tutors to request a further careers appointment.

Year 11 mock job interviews

To attend a job interview is a very daunting experience for most of us – let alone if you have never done it before. All pupils in Year 11 will be in exactly that situation very soon when they have to apply for college courses, sixth form or apprenticeships for when they leave school next summer.

In order for the pupils to overcome these interview fears, Neatherd's Careers Team arranged for local business people to come in and give every single pupil a "mock job interview" for a career of their choice. Twenty-two representatives from different job sectors gave up their valuable time to interview the pupils and give them feedback on their application documents and their interview manners.

Time goes by when everyone is together.

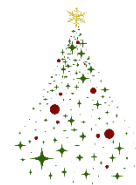

The 12 Online Safety Tips of Christmas

FOR CHILDREN WITH NEW DEVICES

Christmas is almost upon us once again, and soon some lucky children will be excitedly tearing the wrapping off a new mobile phone, tablet or games console. For some of them, it will be the first time they've owned a device that connects them to the online world. Even for older children, a new device means new corners of the digital landscape to explore – and, unfortunately, new risks to be aware of.

We've put together our top tips so that you can guide your young ones in enjoying their new digital gifts safely and responsibly throughout the year to come. Merry Christmas!



1. ALWAYS SET A PASSWORD



If your child's new device has a password protection feature, use it! It'll help to keep their private information safe and will deny others access to their device without permission. Your children's passwords should be something memorable to them – but something which other people can't guess (it's also a good idea for parents to write it down in case it gets forgotten!).

2. SET UP 'PARENTAL CONTROLS'



This really is an essential when your child gets a new device, so they're protected from the outset. Most phones, tablets and consoles allow you to customise their settings to determine which games your child can play, how they can communicate (and who with), what content they can access and so on. It will give you peace of mind that they can't inadvertently do something they shouldn't.

3. PAY ATTENTION TO AGE RATINGS



One of the first things children want to do with any new device is play games and explore apps. Before they download anything or install a new console game, check its age rating. Many popular games and apps have content that's not suitable for younger ages. The safest long-term solution is to adjust the device's settings so they can only download and use games and apps appropriate for their age.

4. KEEP NUMBERS AND DEVICES PRIVATE



Make sure your child understands that they should never share their phone number with someone they don't know or accept a friend request from them. They should also appreciate that it's a good idea to mainly keep their device out of sight, never lend it to a stranger, and never put it down somewhere that other people could steal it or take it to use without asking.

5. HAVE 'THE MONEY CONVERSATION'



Before your children start using their new device in earnest, talk to them about in-app purchases and other ways that money might be spent through their device. Once they understand, you might want to agree on a spending limit and reassure them that they can come to you if they're uncertain, or if they have made a purchase by accident.

6. DISCOURAGE DEVICE DEPENDENCY



Of course, children who've just got a new device will naturally want to spend as much time on it as possible. But whether they're zapping bad guys, watching videos or connecting with friends, it's easy for them to get attached very quickly. Gently remind them that having family time, going outdoors and getting some exercise are still fun, too. And the device will be there when they get back.

7. EXPLAIN SECURE WIFI NETWORKS



Your home WiFi is protected by a password that only your family knows, whereas public networks (like those found in coffee shops, for example) can be accessed by anyone. It's important that your child grasps this difference because, if they're using a portable device on an unsecured network, then a hacker could access their personal information without them even knowing.

8. LIMIT SCREEN TIME



Using a device for too long, especially just before bed, can interfere with a child's sleep quality and reduce their concentration and overall enthusiasm. It might be helpful to agree on certain times of day when they don't use their device. Most devices' settings let you specify a screen-time limit, helping your child to stay fresh and focused in order to perform well at school.

9. ONLY PAIR WITH KNOWN BLUETOOTH DEVICES



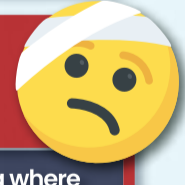
Your child may want to connect to another device via Bluetooth, so they can listen to music wirelessly or share pictures and videos with nearby friends. But if they use Bluetooth to link with a device that they don't know, they're at risk of a stranger being able to see their personal information or having someone transmit a virus onto their device.

10. TURN LOCATION SETTINGS OFF



It's safest to disable the device's location services (if it's a portable device) so your child doesn't inadvertently make other people aware of where they are. You can usually do this via the device's privacy control settings. Turning location settings off not only means your child's whereabouts can't be tracked by others, it also significantly extends battery life.

11. STAY AWARE OF THE SURROUNDINGS



It's quite common to see adults not looking where they're going while engrossed in their phone. Children are even more easily distracted. In some cases, children have been hit by cars or cyclists because they were staring at their device and lost track of where they were. Remind your child that screens and walking don't mix. If they need to use their device, they should stop in a safe place first.

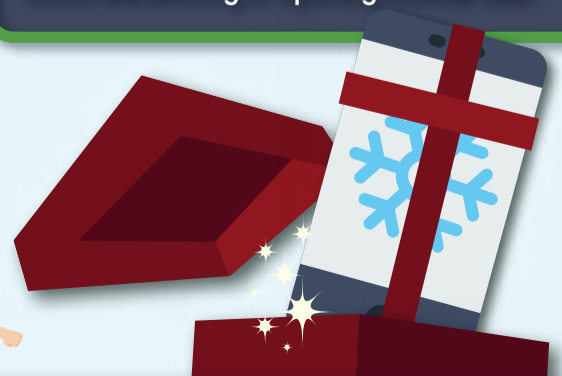
12. BE THERE IF THEY NEED TO TALK



Even when you've made a device as secure as you can, there's still a possibility of your child seeing something that bothers them, or someone they don't know attempting to contact them. If this happens, listen to their concerns, empathise and reassure them. Once they've explained what happened, you can decide if you should take further action like blocking or reporting another user.
