Message from the Headteacher



Welcome to the first edition of our school newsletter for the 2023-24 academic year. Staff and pupils have been back at school for four weeks now and have quickly settled into the rhythm and routines of life in school. We were particularly delighted to welcome our new Year 7 pupils. They have made a great start to their time at Neatherd and have already shown how fully they embrace our values of **compassion, hard work, respect, integrity** and **fairness**. Such a positive start bodes well for them as a year group in the future. You can find out more about their transition to high school inside.

September has also seen the introduction of our new behaviour and rewards policy, along with the relaunch of our house system. The focus of these is to recreate that sense of community and belonging that we, along with schools across the country and the world, found to be lacking in the aftermath of the Covid pandemic. If our young people are to flourish and achieve great things both in their studies and in their wider personal development, they need to know that they are safe, cared for and valued as members of our school family. Our newly enlarged pastoral support team has been busy getting to work with meeting pupils and their families, creating support plans and starting interventions to help pupils with their behaviour, attendance and mental health. Alongside all of this, senior leaders continue to support class teachers by providing a removal system so that we can keep classroom standards high and honour our pledge to disruption-free learning. It is this fine balance of high standards, intensive support and respect for learning that ensures that Neatherd feels like a **traditional, inclusive** and **supportive** school for everyone.

September is also a time for reflection in schools as senior leaders and Heads of Department meet to discuss recent exam results and any learning points as part of our ongoing drive for improvement so that every pupil stands the best chance of getting great results, securing high-quality education and training when they leave us and ultimately allowing them, in the words of our strapline, to **“be whatever you want to be.”** We were delighted with the achievements of our Year 11s. With the support of their teachers and families, and a healthy dose of hard work along the way, they secured results which were considerably above national averages, and with some truly outstanding results in subjects such as science, maths, drama, computing, DT, food and geography, to name just a few. Well done to the Class of 2023 and, as they embark on their final year with us and prepare for their exams, good luck to the Class of 2024!

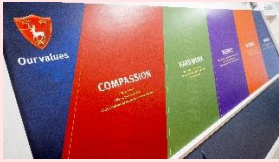

July 2023

Joking aside, pupils arrived and discovered the exciting news of which forms they would be placed in, before having their first ever Neatherd assembly where they made an excellent impression by listening attentively. After the assembly, the pupils got to know their new form tutors and classmates a little better through some form time ice-breakers as well as some carefully designed sessions that helped them find their way around the school and introduced them to Neatherd's core values. The performance on being kind put on by our GCSE drama pupils was a real highlight, resonating with the pupils as it touched on many of the fears and worries, and encouraged discussions of how to resolve them in the following session.

Over the course of the two days, pupils got a taster of a range of different subjects that they could look forward to at Neatherd including science, art, music, history, geography, ICT, PE and a language. Despite pupils' initial nerves, staff were really impressed throughout the events by the enthusiasm and politeness of the newest members of the Neatherd community and it was great to see some new friendships forming. Lots of Golden Tickets were also won which suggests the current crop of Year 7 could look to break some house point records! There was a lot of excited chatter as pupils relayed the events of the day both to each other, and to parents as they left the school gates, suggesting a lot of fun was had by all and most of the nerves had been set aside. Huge credit goes to the outgoing Mrs Jacobs who once again showed her professionalism and dedication by organising the incredibly successful days and helped make the transition process incredibly smooth for staff and pupils alike.

GCSE Results Day

On Thursday 24th August, our Year 11 pupils took a break from their long summer holiday to come into school and receive their exam results. They had worked hard in class, done all of their coursework, put time and effort into packed revision schedules and sat dozens of exam papers throughout May and June. They had heard from their teachers and from the media that results were likely to return to 2019 levels, following three years of higher pass rates nationally. Unsurprisingly, many were asking themselves, 'Have I done enough?'

Once they had opened the envelopes bearing their results sheet, those nervous expressions on their faces soon turned to beaming smiles and, in some cases, tears of joy (or relief?). The Class of 2023 had done it! Once again, Neatherd pupils had achieved fantastic results and they were on their way to college, Sixth Form and apprenticeships to begin the next stage of their education.

71% of pupils achieved a grade 4 or higher (equivalent of the old grade C) in both English and maths. Across all subjects and all exam entries, over one in five results were at grade 7 or higher – the same as the old grade A. Ten pupils achieved an average point score of 80 or above, meaning that their average grade was 8 or higher. Pupils at all levels made phenomenal progress from their starting point of Key Stage 2 SATS results, with many achieving one or two grades higher than expected on average across all subjects. Proof, as ever, that hard work does indeed pay off.



As well as congratulating pupils on their achievements, we thank their teachers, support staff and of course their families for all the support they have provided over the course of five years.

Well done, ex-Year 11! We wish you the best of luck for the future and look forward to hearing of your achievements

in years to come. In the meantime, do come back to visit us and receive your well-earned exam certificates at our **Year 11 Leavers Presentation Evening on Tuesday 12th December.**

Cowper

Mr Sinclair here, proud to have been asked to lead the new Cowper House! I have been at Neatherd for many years, teaching DT, ICT and now settled in the brilliant geography department.

William Cowper (pronounced 'Cooper') was a famous poet and writer of hymns back in the 1700's. In his early years Cowper (pictured right) showed great resilience to overcome struggles with depression after his mum died, to complete school going on to study Law and Classics.

Cowper went on to become a writer of hymns, some of which are still sung today in churches around the world! One of his hymns used the phrase 'God moves in Mysterious Ways' which inspired the chart-topping track by U2 called 'Mysterious Ways'.

Cowper wrote many poems that are still studied and recalled now. He showed **compassion** by writing poems that were used in support of the abolition of slavery, some later being quoted by Martin Luther King. In one of his poems Cowper coined the phrase 'Variety is the spice of life', which is still used widely today!

The Cowper House is the red house, so I hope to see lots of red in the many different House competitions that will take place through the year. Competitions will be for both pupils and staff, but the best way of earning House Points is to work hard in lessons, just like William Cowper did at school! I look forward to a fabulous year ahead with Cowper topping the House Points league table!

Cavell

I'm Mrs Gormley, an Assistant Headteacher at Neatherd. I'm thrilled to lead Cavell House. I've been at Neatherd for 11 years, and 9 years ago I was Head of Cavell House. Edith Cavell, an inspiring figure, embodies our Neatherd values. During WWI in occupied Belgium, she was a hardworking nurse, showing **compassion** by aiding soldiers from all sides. In August 1915, she displayed **integrity** by admitting to helping British and French soldiers escape the German army. Edith, a Norfolk native, rests at Norwich Cathedral.

In Cavell, our house colour is blue. We strive to be compassionate, hardworking, respectful, display **integrity**, and treat everyone fairly – mirroring Edith Cavell's example. Exciting competitions are ahead for us, involving both staff and pupils, as well as a competition to see which house gets the most housepoints this year. I'm eager to lead Cavell House once again and look forward to enjoying time with our Cavell community!



Fry

Welcome to Fry House! I'm Mrs. Gerrard, an Assistant Headteacher at Neatherd, and I'm delighted to be the Head of Fry House. Most of all, she embodied the spirit of integrity – Elizabeth Fry came from a wealthy family, choosing to use her influence to make things better for the less wealthy people in society.

CyberFirst Girls Competition November 2023

The CyberFirst Girls Competition aims to inspire girls interested in technology to pursue a career in cyber security. This is an industry where only 22% of posts are held by women.

Last year we took a group of year 7 girls on a trip to BT Adastral Park for a CyberSecurity day to provide them with opportunities to find out about working in the industry in the build up to the competition.



The competition is only open to girls in years 8 and 9 and we are hoping to recruit enough for several teams this year. This year's competition runs from 20th to 29th November 2023. Girls can enter as a team of four, in smaller groups or as individuals and then be put into a team.



Mr Gibson and Miss Skipper, a former BT computing engineer and now part of the school admin team, will be mentoring the teams during the competition period. A team from another Enrich Trust high school won the "Top scoring state school" event last year and as part of the prize they had a great opportunity to go on a trip to the celebration event and awards night in Belfast all paid for by sponsors of the competition.

Every girl from the winning teams will take a brand-new laptop home and have a chance to win prize money for their school.

Rewards for excellent work experience reports

118 of our Year 11 pupils were recently rewarded for their performance during the work experience week which took place in July during Activities Week. Each of those pupils received 50 house points and an Excellence Certificate for completing excellent work and getting an outstanding report from the employer. That said, we're proud of the achievements of all our pupils who took part.

In all, 222 pupils took part in our recent work experience, attending 159 different placements, mainly in Norfolk.

The closest placements were at Neatherd – in the canteen, library and in the PE department. The furthest placement was in Ramsdean, Hampshire, in the South of England, near Portsmouth.

There was a wide range of placements, from engineers, fitness instructors, shop assistants, plumbers, librarian, sales, farm workers to teaching assistants, labourers, animal care, architects, hair & beauty and website design, motor trade and hospitality.

Construction Workshop for Year 9 pupils

Some of our Year 9 pupils are taking part in a construction project being led by the school's Enterprise Adviser, Gavin Springall of Persimmon Homes.

The pupils are going to look at how land is being used and how it is decided if it can be built on. Mr Springall is going to take the pupils through the whole process, starting with the planning, designing and finally building of a house. Mr Springall started the project off with looking at the different jobs in the construction sector, from bricklayers and carpenters to surveyors and architects, explaining what their responsibilities are and what qualification you would need for such a job.

Post 16 options evening

Very soon, our Year 11 pupils will have to make the decision where they would like to go after they leave Neatherd. A vocational course at a college, taking A-levels at 6th form or doing an apprenticeship – the choice of Post 16 providers is huge and there is a vast number of courses and subjects to choose from.

To support our pupils, the Careers Team put on another very successful Post 16 options evening. Over 40 providers, including City and Easton College, Access Creative College, all the local 6th forms, the Army and RAF, the Police and Prison Service, training providers such as Poultec and JTL Training and local employers like Ben Burgess, GT Bunning and Anglian Home Improvement set up their stalls in the sports hall and canteen.

The pupils and parents attended to speak with the different organisations to find out more information about the courses and careers on offer.

“We were impressed with the number of parents and pupils attending and the levels of engagement that they showed,” says Mr Hodges, Careers Leader. The next action is for pupils and parents to start attending open events.
