


World Book Day House Short Story Competition

Neatherd Sports Tour 2024





To kick off the Easter holidays, 44 pupils from Years 9 & 10 took the long 26-hour bus journey to Lignanao Sabbiadoro, Italy. The week was packed with coaching sessions and fixtures for our netball and football teams, as well as exploring local culture.

The first full day at the Bella Italia Village kicked off with an excellent morning coaching session in the sunshine for both the boys' and girls' football teams. The session focused on possession, ball control and finishing. Meanwhile, the netballers were getting ready for their first training session in the Palazzeto Arena. After both coaching sessions, it was time to get ready for an afternoon in Venice. The weather turned against us during the bus journey to the water taxi and heavy rain poured down. After arriving in Venice, and navigating over the flooded ground on walkway boards, the pupils spent two hours enjoying the sights, some local pizza and spending their pocket money in the nearby shops. Fortunately, the rain did eventually stop and everyone was able to soak up the Venetian culture.





The evening brought the first fixture for the year 9 boys'

football team against Heanor Gate. The hard-fought and competitive fixture ended in a 3-1 victory to Neatherd with a penalty from Alfie B, but the stand out being a free kick from Ryan L which went flying into the top corner. Everyone else from the group cheered the team from the sidelines, singing and chanting louder than any other school! This very quickly became the trend of the tour – and it created a real sense of togetherness between all 44 pupils.

Day two brought a fixture-packed day with the girls' football team up first against Bridgnorth U16 girls. Despite some excellent play in the warm conditions, the fixture ended in a 2-0 defeat. The girls worked their socks off and were unlucky to be on the losing side. They soon put this defeat behind them just an hour later, with a thumping 4-0 victory against St Phillys Girls, with the goals coming from Poppy W-P and Izzy, with Priya scoring a brace.



The year 10 boys then had their first fixture of the trip, coming up against Bridgnorth, and once again the great efforts were not rewarded as the game finished in a 2-0 defeat for the team. The afternoon and evening brought a second training session, as well as some deserved and muchneeded down time on the beach.

Day three had more fixtures in store and to start the day off the

netballers began their tournament. The footballers were able to spectate throughout the day and support the team in the same fashion that had been seen on the side of the football pitches – the netball arena didn't know what had hit it! The girls had an amazing tournament and made it all the way to the final, which was an end to end game, unfortunately not ending the way they would have liked. They all played incredibly well and should be very proud of their efforts.





The afternoon brought the final football fixtures, the first being the year 9 boys who finished their tour with a defeat versus a well organised Harris Chafford U15's. Second up were the girls - could they follow up their great win from the day before? Yes, they could! The girls finished their tour with a 2-1 win in a well-deserved and determined performance against Bridgnorth U14 Girls. Both goals this time came from Izzy, in what was a great team effort from every single player in the team and a thoroughly deserved win.

Lastly, the year 10 team played, wanting to finish the tour with a win against Heanor Gate. Just like the year 9 game, Heanor Gate put up a very tough, physical game against the year 10s, but a great last-minute through ball from Lucas saw Tyler scoring and finishing off the tour with a win. After the fixture, dinner was quickly eaten before we all headed to the disco to dance the night away!



Business Breakfast for Year 7 pupils at Neatherd High School

Neatherd High School recently organised a Business Breakfast for 80 of our Year 7 pupils in the school canteen. The school was delighted to welcome sixteen business professionals from a wide range of job sectors who were happy to give up their time to be quizzed by the pupils.

The school is very grateful to the representatives from NR Health & Fitness, Machined Precision Components Ltd, Persimmon Homes, Barnham Broom Hotel, The Grove Vets, Norfolk Constabulary, Wellington Dental Practice, Larking & Gowen, Lotus Cars, Swank Interiors, Toftwood Infant and Junior School Federation, South Holland District Council and to Neatherd's Librarian, Mrs Holmes, for supporting our careers provision in this way. Pupils and professionals enjoyed a small breakfast and each group of pupils then had about 15 minutes with different employers where they asked them a range of questions. "The employers were impressed with the maturity and conduct of the youngsters and found the experience very rewarding and enjoyable," says Mr Hodges, Careers Leader at Neatherd. "The pupils conducted themselves very well and really engaged with me, asking lots of interesting questions," said Joanna Pedlow, Executive Headteacher from the Toftwood Infant and Junior School Federation.

Year 10 Apprenticeship Afternoon

What is an apprenticeship? How can I find one? How much can apprentices earn? These were only a few of the questions our Year 10 pupils were able to ask at our recent Apprenticeship Afternoon.

Over 20 apprenticeship providers, training companies, colleges and employers set up their stalls in the Sports Hall and all of our Year 10 cohort were able to speak to them. The organisations covered a wide range of job sectors, including accountancy, engineering, construction, policing, veterinary and health & social care.

The pupils also asked questions about general careers in those professional fields and the providers were impressed with their interest and general attitude: "It was a great afternoon and I was very impressed with the way the pupils engaged with the event. I had some great conversations with the Year 10s about their futures," says Jo Kirkby, Apprenticeship Advisor of Norfolk County Council.

The next careers event for our Year 10 pupils is their work experience in July. They will spend one week with local employers to find out about working in an adult environment and learn important skills such as working in a team and time keeping. We are sure that the pupils will have a great time with the employers and it will help them to make decisions on their first steps into a future career.

Apprenticeships - interviews with Neatherd Alumni

It is never too early to start thinking about your next steps for after you leave High School – you can go to college, study A-levels or take an apprenticeship.

Are you interested in working, earning and getting qualifications at the same time? Then an apprenticeship might be the right choice for you. An apprenticeship is a real job. You will be employed, earn a salary and get paid holidays while working towards qualifications and gaining skills that employers want. You will learn at a pace that suits you and be supported by a mentor.

Across the country there are over 600 approved apprenticeships available, covering a wide variety of occupations in different job sectors from surveying to accountancy to veterinary nursing. Apprenticeships are available to anyone over the age of 16, so you could apply for one after leaving school, college or sixth form, university or even after having worked for several years.

Neatherd's Careers Team contacted some of last year's leavers who were successful in securing an apprenticeship, to see how they are getting on and ask for their advice to our current pupils. See our three short interviews below:

Jamie

Where are you doing your apprenticeship and what is the company name? GT Bunning and Sons

What is the title and level of your apprenticeship? Level 3 Metal Fabricator

What did you have to do to find this apprenticeship – was it difficult? I got it through work experience, it was not hard.

What type of work do you do in your apprenticeship? Welding

Do you enjoy your apprenticeship – what is the best bit? Yes, getting paid and not being in a classroom.

What are your top tips for current Year 11 pupils wanting to find an apprenticeship? Figure out what you want to do and pick something you enjoy. Don't be silly at school.



Where are you doing your apprenticeship and what is the company name? I am doing an apprenticeship in Civil Engineering and I study one day a week at City College Norwich.

What is the title and level of your apprenticeship? Civil Engineering Apprenticeship level 3

What did you have to do to find this apprenticeship – was it difficult?

No, because my dad works for Anglia Formwork too but I had to get level 4s in 4 subjects to get onto the course.

What type of work do you do in your apprenticeship?

I do physical work outside on building sites like steel fixing, shuttering and concreting.

Do you enjoy your apprenticeship – what is the best bit?

I like that I get paid every month whilst learning on the job.

What are your top tips for current Year 11 pupils wanting to find an apprenticeship?

Think about what you want to do in the future and contact companies independently. It's a great way of earning money whilst learning too. You also get more experience in the real world and work with people of all ages.

Harry

Where are you doing your apprenticeship and what is the company name? At a local manufacturing plant

What is the title and level of your apprenticeship?

With Quality Assurance and the course is level 3 Azure Cloud Support Services Apprenticeship



What did you have to do to find this apprenticeship – was it difficult?

I found my apprenticeship online. I kept checking for local Computer Engineer apprenticeships in Norfolk. I looked on Google and Facebook and on other social media platforms. You can search for "Apprenticeships in Norfolk" for a results page.

What type of work do you do in your apprenticeship?

In my apprenticeship I do a large range of tasks such as access control, I maintain the security of devices, I install new hardware such as networking equipment, CCTV Equipment and infrastructure equipment. I also ensure that hardware is installed safely and fully secured using tools such as Kensington locks.

Do you enjoy your apprenticeship – what is the best bit?

I enjoy my apprenticeship as I'm learning from highly skilled colleagues, which is a good way to learn as you are completing tasks at the same time. I can also apply some of the skills I learnt in the classroom to my workplace. I prefer to learn in the field as it helps me understand things more quickly and easily after seeing it done in the workplace. The apprenticeship element is 20% classroom and 80% work placement. I also like how you can earn a wage while you learn.

What are your top tips for current Year 11 pupils wanting to find an apprenticeship?

Speak to your careers advisor at school, they may be able to help put you in touch with the right people. Also, when I attended the Careers Evening at Neatherd, there was an apprenticeship stand with lots of different information and opportunities. When I attended the City College open evening, there was a specific room for apprenticeships that City College offer. I would begin by creating a CV, then searching Google and job websites for a placement.

Introducing Thinking Reading

This academic year we have implemented a new intervention programme at Neatherd: Thinking Reading.

We have five highly trained Thinking Reading teachers to deliver this one-to-one intervention: Miss Steward, Mrs Hunton, Mrs Browne, Ms Holmes and Ms Sangster.

What is Thinking Reading?

Thinking Reading is an intervention programme, designed by James and Dianne Murphy (former teachers and educational leaders), that closes the gap between a reader's chronological age and their reading age. The assessment process is precise and accurate so that our teachers identify exactly what pupils don't know, and then plan their individual lessons accordingly so that pupils make rapid progress. Pupils graduate the programme once the gap has been closed and their reading age matches their chronological age.

How do we identify pupils in need of the intervention?

Every pupil completes a standardised test (NGRT) which assesses their reading and comprehension. From this data, we identify pupils in KS3 whose gap is 2+ years, and 3+ years in KS4. These pupils complete a second NGRT test to ensure there are no anomalies in the data. If their second set of data consistently shows there is a gap, a Thinking Reading teacher will complete a Probe assessment with the pupil to precisely identify their reading age and reading behaviours. If this assessment confirms that there is a gap between the pupil's chronological age and reading age (as per the measurement above), they begin Thinking Reading intervention.

What do the lessons entail?

A pupil who has been identified as needing Thinking Reading intervention will complete a Diagnostic assessment which enables the teacher to identify exactly what sound-spellings a pupil is unable to read accurately and fluently. This precise and detailed assessment means that pupils are never taught what they already know and can therefore make rapid progress. Following this, lessons begin! Pupils are taught to both decode and spell the sound-spellings identified in the Diagnostic assessment through targeted practice, fluency practice, whole-book reads and extended writing. Each pupil receives three 30-minute, one-to-one, personalised lessons a week and, after each lesson, their progress is recorded to inform the teacher's planning of the next lesson. A pupil's progress is carefully tracked and assessed in each lesson so that pupils can graduate the programme as soon as their reading age matches their chronological age, and the gap has been closed.

Success stories from our first cohort

- In just two short months, Pupil A's reading age improved by 2 years and 2 months.
- On average, Pupil B made over a year's worth of progress in each 30-minute lesson.
- Teachers have recognised Pupil C's confidence in lessons improve as a result of their Thinking Reading lessons.
- Our first cohort of pupils made between 0.86 and 1.67 years' worth of progress in each 30 minute lesson.

Our Aim

Our aim is to ensure that every pupil leaves Neatherd as a confident, accurate and fluent reader.

Here is some useful information from 'The Sleep Charity'...

How students manage exam-time stress can have a huge impact on their ability to perform under pressure. Exam time has always been stressful, but loss of sleep, increased caffeine consumption and unhealthy snacking are sure-fire ways to create a less than optimal exam-time performance. Lack of sleep can end up clouding judgement or increasing the number of mistakes made. Students should try to get at least seven to nine hours of sleep a night, particularly on the night before an exam.



Here are some of The Sleep Charity's tips to surviving the exam season:

Be prepared: The best way to manage stress and anxiety around exam time is to be as prepared as possible. Draw up a rough 'revision timetable' of what you need to revise when to ensure every subject is covered - and stick to it!

Sleep well: Most people need at least six to eight hours of sleep every night - so no pulling an all-nighter to cram for an exam! Lack of sleep results in poor coping strategies for managing stress and 'fuzzy' thinking. The best bet by far is to study often and in advance and build in a good rest before the big day. Sleeping on a comfortable, supportive bed can really help with a good night's sleep.

Ditch the devices: While it's important to stay connected to friends during a stressful time, make sure to factor in a digital detox every evening. Turn off devices at least an hour before bed so you're not tempted to talk about exams, revision or stay mentally stimulated by watching videos etc.

Eat well: Stress eating can seriously disrupt healthy eating habits. Keep healthy, easy-to-eat snacks around such as nuts or fresh fruit and don't overload on caffeine to try to stay awake.

Get physical: Physical exertion provides an outlet for mental stress. Let off some steam by walking, running, getting involved in a sport etc. It helps you to sleep better.

Practise a relaxation technique: Relaxation techniques can help to create a sense of calm and are simple to perform in the bedroom without any special equipment. Deep breathing with your eyes closed is a simple way to remedy stress. Focus on your breath as you deeply inhale and exhale.

Positive self-talk: Thoughts, feelings, and behaviour are connected so it's important to monitor self talk, focus on the present, set realistic goals, and remain appropriately optimistic.
