They had the option to study photography for the first time as part of their Key Stage 3 curriculum.

This has involved an introduction to using Apple Macs and Photoshop to create surreal portraits.

We were delighted to have the opportunity to design and decorate a Leveret as part of the GoGoHares project. Supported by Miss Jay and Mr S Wright, the students were inspired by the local landscape and their sculpture has been described by organisers as 'outstanding'! The GoGoHare will be on display in the GGC Gallery Space at the Dining Terrace in INTU Chapelfield until the middle of September.

With the changes to the homework policy for Key Stage 3, we have started to hold more art competitions for **Year 7** students to show off their skills in extra-curricular activities. **Jess Day** won first prize for her Dragon Easter Egg. **Amelie Passam** and **Calum Jones** won joint first



prize for their pet portraits in biro!

Art Club has been busy all year learning a range of techniques from book binding to wire sculpture and clay pots. They have held their own competitions also, with high calibre outcomes seen in the sunset competition.

The dance groups **'Ignite'** and **'Illusions'** showed professionalism and commitment in their self-choreographed pieces, illustrating the selfmotivation and creativity of our dance students

Year 10 students also produced some lovely creative work this year, both in the concert and in class, so we have high hopes for the outcome of their GCSE results in 2019. The standard of work is very good and will only get better over the coming year.

Year 8 Dance had a fabulous time learning Greased Lighting' for their Directed Choreography unit and all classes over the year showed themselves to be very adept at picking up movement quickly and clearly. The two classes that performed in the dance concert only

had two weeks to prepare and they performed brilliantly on the night! "I am really looking forward to working with students on a musical theatre workshop to be presented at the end of November. This will really test the

students' ability to be a 'triple threat' and improve their singing, dancing and acting all in one go," says dance teacher, Ms Dark. It is also great to see students working in our various lunchtime and after-school classes with Ms Carter De Bois (qualified ISTD dance teacher) on various styles of dance and on improving their technical ability. We aim to create many projects over the coming years, where students can gain performance and choreographic experience in various forms of dance and theatre.

Ghostly, gothic goings-on make for **chilling** drama

The whole cast pulled off a complete tour-de-force with their dedication to what proved to be a challenging play

The year began with students and staff involved in a project that linked Neatherd with three other Norfolk schools: Aylsham High, Ormiston Victory Academy and Alderman Peel High School. The four schools worked together in a performance of a new musical play, "**When Marnie was There**", written by Ms Dark, Neatherd's dance and drama teacher. The play is set on the north Norfolk coast and tells the story of a lonely teenaged orphan who finds friendship with a mysterious character called Marnie. As the story unfolds, it becomes clear that there's more to Marnie than meets the mortal eye and a ghostly but heart-warming tales follows.

As one show ended, Neatherd's actors began rehearsals for the 2018 school production. With a much shorter timescale than usual, Mrs Sanderson joined forces with the English department and the decision was made to stage an adaptation of the dark, gothic tale, **"The Strange Case of Doctor Jekyll and Mr**

Hyde", a GCSE English Literature text for all students in Years 10 and 11.

Adam Littleproud provided the sinister alterego to Bradley Dack's mild-mannered Mr Hyde, with Pearl Williams-Eley as Jekyll's feisty sister Katherine. Newcomers this year included Eddie Hill and Ben Harvey, both Year 7 students who coped amazingly well with a huge amount of lines to learn in a very short space of time.

Indeed, the whole cast pulled off a complete tour-de-force with their dedication to what proved to be a challenging play with extremely complex Victorian language and concepts. Because of the short timescale between November when rehearsals began and February when the show was staged, the cast put in rehearsal time most evenings and Sundays too.

Rehearsals for next year's production have already begun for the "**Golden Masque of Agamemnon**", another dark tale of cruelty and revenge with opportunities for actors and dancers alike.









This year's music students prove that Neatherd's Got **Talent!**

It's been another busy year for Neatherd's music department, starting off with our talented performers being asked to entertain visitors during open evening. Guests were able to enjoy various musical styles in the canteen between tours of the school.

This was quickly followed up by **Neatherd's Got Talent**, and not exclusively just a musical competition, this year's judge's award went to **Robyn**

Spellacy for her outstanding vocal and guitar performance, with plenty of other musicians taking part and receiving positive feedback for their performances.

Next up was the **Christmas concert**. Students who participated all had to perform a piece with a Christmas theme, which lead to some interesting

arrangements. Performers at the concert included the school choir **'Kaleidoscope'**, the **Neatherd Buskers**, the newlyformed **Neatherd Function Band** and of course, our hugely talented and enthusiastic solo singers and instrumentalists.

The summer concert this year was organised and managed by the Year 10 BTEC music students. It was held at the Memorial Hall in Dereham and the theme for the concert was 'Live Wire', meaning that all performances had to be live; the use of backing tracks forbidden. It was a great opportunity for our musicians to take to the stage and perform in a professional environment.

We also took great pleasure in welcoming Toftwood Junior School Ukulele Group to

perform at the concert. We hope that this will be the first of many collaborative musical opportunities between the two schools.

STEM

From Lego to robotic arms, there was lots to **excite** STEM students

It has been another exciting year for those students working on **STEM** projects. As well as the usual **Lego League**, pupils have been embarking on a number of exciting projects.

Lego League

Neatherd STEM once again competed in the Lego League. This year we hosted for the first time since the East of England Regional event has not been able to run elsewhere. We are really pleased that the event will now be run at the Forum and Neatherd High School is working in partnership with the Forum and Educator Solutions to make this year's event even bigger!

Robotics

A number of STEM pupils have been working on a 'Robotic Arm' project, which has led pupils to work with microprocessors and servos. It has been hard work... but it is beginning to take shape.

RAF Marham

We were invited to take part in the 100 years celebration of the RAF. Pupils were given a tour of a number of stands demonstrating the work STEM has made in developing new technology for the Air Force. **Josh Lee** completed the Towers of Hanoi challenge in 42s, and won the scaled model of F-35s.

Design School

The **Design & Technology** department has been successful in securing funding to run an out-of-hours design school. Pupils will be invited to work on real life projects and work in partnership with local industry.

Great facilities enable pupils to create **high skill** products

Food Preparation and Nutrition

This is proving to be an exciting new GCSE and we are awaiting our first cohort results this summer. The students have demonstrated the excellent skills they have honed from

Key Stage 3 to produce some amazing assessments.

The **Year 10** students have been enthusiastic and motivated with excellent mock results which is promising for our second cohort. Students in Key Stage 3 have been cooking many quality dishes with the food provided by the school.

They have been making products including vegetable chilli, bread, pasta bake and pineapple upside-down cake.

Students are very lucky to have a beautiful cooking facility with food industry standard equipment.

Having these facilities has allowed us to make some high skill products such as choux pastry, focaccia bread and many types of pasta. We owe special thanks to the hard work and dedication of our food technician, Mrs Patterson, who organises all the equipment and arranges all the ingredients. We have fantastic news that some of the GCSE food students have decided to carry on their catering studies post-16.











Students **create** pop-up pages, jewellery, and digital design

Our **Year 7** students have been studying paper mechanics as well as modern children's illustrators. They have been applying this to their own work by writing and making their own popup books. All students have really enjoyed this project as it gives them so much opportunity for their own input and creativity.

In **Year 8**, the students have been learning about digital design packages and how to use these to create their own 'race and chase' themed board games.

They have all got to grips with the package quickly and created some very exciting, as well as fun to play, games.

The **Year 9** students have had a fantastic time this year, designing their own contemporary jewellery. They have been looking into the work of three contemporary designers and using this as the influence for their work. They have also been investigating different types of net design to create their own product packaging.

GCSE

This has been an exciting year for Key Stage 4 Graphics as the **Year 11** students completed their coursework projects. We had a number of very impressive projects from the students who really showed off all their broad range of skills.

A few projects that really stood out were Nathan Hughes' "Abduction" activity pack, Bethany Hamilton's "Fantasy Creatures" activity pack and Nathan Lesiuk's 'Bone Zone' board game.





They have all got to grips with the package quickly and created some very exciting, as well as fun to play, games.

It's all about **precision** and **improvement** for these students

The learning focus in Key Stage 3 Materials Technology has been accuracy when measuring, marking out and cutting. Pupils have also been getting to grips with trying to identify areas for improvement in their projects as they work through them.

Year 7 students have had the challenge of designing, developing and making picture

frames from mixed materials this year. Some excellent examples have been produced.

Year 8 saw a new project for 2017-18. A mixed materials phone holder and desk tidy has been this year's challenge. Pupils have learnt quite advanced woodworking techniques (finger joints).

Along with this they have been using CAD (2D Design) to design components and sub-assemblies for their projects. Designs are then cut from acrylic and manufactured board using a CNC laser cutter. Again, some brilliant work was produced.

Year 9 students have continued with the ever popular 'interesting box project'. This brings together previous skills and knowledge learnt in Year 7 and 8, and builds into a more challenging and complex project. Pupils are given more freedom to be creative with their designs. Some truly excellent work has been produced.

Key stage 4 has seen some excellent final projects again this year. **Joe Culyer** produced a shop quality storage unit with some interesting angles and splined mitre joints holding the whole thing together. Simple but superb!

Woodwork club has been producing mini gravity racers again. Some great wheeled wonders designed and made!

Lots of **creative** ideas and high quality work on show this year

It has been another exciting year for those students in Systems and Control. As well as covering the curriculum, the students have been able to apply the skills to make high quality final pieces.

Vacuum Forming

Year 7 students used the industrial process of vacuum forming to produce the casing of their steady hand game. It is sooooo satisfying to watch the plastic mould over the design!

Mechanisms

Year 8 have been learning about the four types of motion and applying their knowledge of movement to mechanical toys.

Laser Cutting

Year 9 have been constructing beat detection circuits, the casing for which pupils designed using CAD CAM software and then watched the LASER cutter machine it for them.

Controlled Assessment

The NEW GSCE Design & Technology Controlled Assessment has been launched. **Year 10** pupils have been given a wide range of possibilities in tackling real world problems. We look forward to seeing the design ideas of our future engineers!

GCSE Exam Bike Light

For Year 11, the preliminary material for the GSCE said the exam questions would focus on road safety for cyclists. We tried a number of different design ideas and attempted to second guess the examiners – it seemed too easy to focus on bike lights. But luckily it **was** bike lights, so the cohort was very well prepared!



Message to fashion students – **'be who you want to be'**

Key Stage 3 students have designed and made a range of products this year and have

developed their art-based textiles skills. Year 11 students have worked hard throughout the year so that the class was strongly represented in this year's fashion show and exhibition in July.

The fashion show featured students' own work from Year 9 textiles lessons and textiles club. We focused on vintage fashion and rethinking historical costume to give old stuff a new twist.

To do this, we looked at what people wore as far back as 500 years ago and reinvented shapes and styles to suit the 21st century.

The fashion show also featured a section we called "Be Who You Want to Be". For this students designed, customised and manufactured their own garments for the cat walk.

Special thanks must go out to the staff and helpers who have supported **Textiles Club** this year. Lower school pupils have been inspired to produce amazing products and their technical ability never fails to amaze. On top of that achievement, the homework produced by many students has been of exceptional quality.

Looking ahead to next year we are going to be integrating the Cook Off events with the House competitions, so lots of house points will be up for grabs to the participants and winners!

This year's SNAG trips were to Crushed Foods, Honingham Thorpe Farm and Nurtured in Norfolk to pick up growing skills and ideas that we can use in the school garden as well as to educate the whole school on how to get involved with field to fork activities.

Year 10 BBC School Report

Year 10 students studying GCSE media studies participated in BBC School report in March. They researched, interviewed, edited and created news stories to meet the 3pm deadline. "BBC School report day was really challenging, it gave us a snapshot into the world of being a journalist. We really enjoyed it despite the pressures of the day," said Amber Macey. Their stories were wide-ranging and included: men's mental health issues: the negative side effects of social media; the importance of reading for pleasure in a digital world, which included an interview with author Holly Smale; budget cuts impacting on creative arts in schools; women's lack of involvement in sport for pleasure after education. Mrs Hunt (subject leader for media studies) commented: "I was very

impressed with the story choices that students made- it really showed an awareness of the pressures on education and young people." The reports

Harry Potter Year 10

In March Year 10 GCSE media studies, CiDA and drama students visited Leavesden Studios to explore the world of Harry Potter! They explored studio one which contained props from all the films, enabled them to practise spell casting with wands, fly broomsticks and have their photos taken using green screen technology before walking through the new Forbidden Forest display filled with smoke, spiders and a weather machine! They then 'rode' the Hogwarts train and tried, in vain, to push their luggage carts through Platform 9³/₄. In studio two they enjoyed walking down Diagon Alley, exploring the animatronics and graphic design work before ending at a giant model of Hogwarts lit up alternatively as both night and day. Students also attended one of two workshops designed to support their GCSE option choice; they attended a workshop on either the script to screen process or character characterisation. In these

workshops students were able to use pieces of fabric from the films' costumes to design their own Harry Potter character, and explore a range of character props. "It was the best trip ever!" said Ryan, "I learnt lots and really enjoyed it."

Own movie showcase

Students in Year 10 media studies have created a range of videos to showcase to the class, these have been the product of much hard work. These have included students interviewing visitors and authors for BBC School Report and creating assemblies. Amber Macey and Charley Bugeja created an amazing assembly which was shown to the all students. It focused on raising awareness of the impact of media images on the self-esteem and confidence of young people.

Crime and **dance** featured in this year's learning days

On the first **Flexible Learning Day** in November, our **Year 7s** enjoyed a great day in the sun at Wells and Overstrand with the geography department looking at coastal erosion and defences.

Year 8 had time to look deeper at discovering their own identity while others experienced Capoeira Dance, a form of Brazilian fighting movement. Lots of Year 9 students went to the

Natural History Museum in London to look at the variety and diversity of life on earth.

The second FLD took place in March. Year 7 pupils spent a challenging day designing computer programmes and websites, using CSS (Cascading Style Sheets). Year 8 pupils took a trip out to Wroxham to investigate tourism, which included a boat trip to Salhouse Broad.

Year 9 pupils learnt a great deal about crime and consequences, and adopted different roles within the justice system.











Many **positive** responses to a week of very varied activities

There were many brilliant activities and trips that took place during **Curriculum Enhancement Week**, including the **Year 7** trip to Normandy, the **Year 8** trip to Bramley Lakes and **Year 9** Battlefield trips to France and Belgium. All of our **Year 10** students took part in one week of **Work Experience** with local and national employers.

At school, the Year 7 students joined the **Creative Arts Faculty** for a day full of "other cultures" experiences. In drama they "visited" Italy and experimented with the 15th century roots of modern slapstick comedy: **Commedia Dell'Arte**. They also learned "**The Time Warp**" (dance) – as an example of American gothic. In music they got to grips with South American samba rhythms and in art they "went" to France and created portraits using pointillism.

During the week, **Year 8** students spent some time in science working together to build and launch rockets across the school field! They then had the opportunity to explore the feasibility of living and working on Mars and build a model orbiter or lander!

Year 9 students took part in a number of different business challenges at school where they had to work as a team. Luke Askew, who is a motivational speaker, delivered two sessions to help students fulfil their potential! Year 9 geographers who have opted to take the subject for GCSE visited Norwich to undertake some fieldwork. The enquiry skills learnt on the day will be invaluable moving forward to GCSE.

Year 9s also had an important day learning about relationships and sex education. They experienced external visitors talking to them about contraception, sexting, gender and sexual identity, and the importance of healthy relationships. Students spoke with huge positivity about the day and our visitors spoke very positively about them!

Students from the SRB have enjoyed some time on Work Experience at Morrison's in Dereham, as well as time baking a superb apple crumble with Mr Taylor!

Friends support with fun events

The **Brilliant Club's Scholars Programme** aims to support students from state schools to get into highly selective universities. Currently, private school students are far more likely to apply for the top universities, which is not right.

In February the programme began with a launch trip and the first tutorial at **Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge University**. On the launch trip, students got a comprehensive tour of the grounds, an 'Information, Advice and Guidance' session talking through every aspect of university and a chance to talk with a current student.

Student council encourages pupils to **get involved**

The **school council** is a brilliant way to get students of all years actively engaged with finding ways to improve the school. It is made up of twenty core members including volunteered students, House Captains and Head boy and Head girl. The head people frequently make recommendations. From recent meetings, the prevalent topic of discussion has been centred around making the school more economical by reducing the amount of waste produced.



The **SNAG** group is a crucial part of the school council and actively took surveys of how many bins are present around the grounds and the proportion of the school that is littered. The school council meetings are also attended

by governors who listen to the suggestions for improvements to the school and, more recently, the Head people and House Captains have been invited to join the governor meetings which are held after school.

Not only have the school council discussed the various improvements regarding environmental factors, they have also brought up:

- The recently developed behaviour system.
- Ways of improving charity days to raise money for the chosen charities Neatherd support.
- The school curriculum.
- How to improve community time (break and lunch)
- Homework

The school council is an important and useful way for us to provide leadership opportunities for the pupils.



Being a member of the school council is an excellent way to increase participation, teaching young people about democracy, local and global citizenship and accountability.

Recently, the new head people have been elected following a series of tough elimination rounds. The candidates went through rounds of speeches, presentations and interviews to show off various skills. The new Head boy and Head girl for the coming new year are Adam Littleproud and Amber Macey. House captains and deputy house captains are **Josh Welling**, Hannah Spalding, Charlotte Calvert, Arden Scott, Pearl Williams-Eley, Cameron Biro, Tolis lakovou and Jose Tye. The role of student leadership will be increasingly prevalent in the new academic year, getting the head people and captains more actively involved with the community. During charity week at the end of the summer term, we will be raising money for Nelson's Journey, the charity selected by the student body. The house fundraising activities will be run by the house captains and their deputies, aided by the head girl and boy. By having the student leadership organise events such as charity week, this will increase leadership and communication skills.

Gateway activities include **JET propelled** support sessions!

Set up primarily to provide academic support to Pupil Premium students, the Gateway has become widely recognised as a place of support for the whole school since it opened its doors five years ago, with the provision of wraparound homework and revision support.

Home of the official homework club and open from 8.00am in the morning, the Gateway is available to all students before school, at break time, during lunch and after school, finally closing its doors at 4.30pm. Students have access to laptops, a printer and support from one of the three Gateway team members.

During core lesson time, the Gateway provides small group support to Pupil Premium students across the school in English and maths. For new **Year 7s** this could be our Secondary Ready English and maths programmes or, for Year 9, our GCSE Ready programmes. Interventions typically last 12 weeks based on one session per week with programmes tailored to meet the students' needs. Year 11 students, who have an adjusted curriculum, receive tuition in English, maths and science which supports their GCSE work in those subjects. The Gateway works closely with the maths, science and English departments, ensuring that students receive the most effective intervention required to 'plug the gaps' in their knowledge. We receive many positive comments from students. "Being in a small group means it is

> easier to ask questions and have group discussions. "It has

helped boost my confidence." "I have thoroughly enjoyed this intervention."

The Gateway prides itself on having a bright, friendly, welcoming and engaging learning environment. The team is dedicated to raising the achievements of all students and keeps a close eye on Pupil Premium students' progress as they advance through school.

The JET group

Organised and run by the Gateway, the JET group (John Egging Trust) provides weekly sessions (over 10 weeks) for students who may need a bit of extra support with confidence, self-esteem and social relationship building.

The sessions include team building and leadership activities, all designed to make students 'think outside the box', work together and feel part of decision processes. As part of the programme, the students also take part in visits to RAF Honington where RAF colleagues put on a range of activities is easier for students to take part in. In June, marking the 100th anniversary of the RAF, students met second-in-command of the RAF, Deputy Commander Operations, Air Marshal Stuart Atha, also Patron of the John Egging Trust.

The SRB is the school's **Specialist Resource Base for Autism**, catering for 22 students from all over the county. Our ten members of specialist staff support the students in accessing mainstream lessons as well as involving them in life skills and community activities: walking to local shops, buying ingredients and cooking, gardening and learning about money, bank accounts and businesses.

The SRB is purpose-built with its own kitchen, crafts area, group area, workstations and computers.





The Link

Take it from those who know: The Link is **awesome**

Welcome to **The Link**, Neatherd's dedicated SEND Resource Base which is located opposite reception at the front of the school. Within The Link, we provide support for students in the resource base and across the school in a variety of ways to meet their wide-ranging needs.

We are open daily to students from all year groups before school, at break, lunch and after school. **Homework Club** with support is available until 4.30pm daily. During these times, students are able to access a wide range of resources including games, Lego, construction items, computers for homework and subject-based software packages, as well as socialise. On Fridays, a small group of students play Dungeons & Dragons, a strategy role playing game. Our photographs provide an insight into the ways in which we learn within The Link, during timetabled lessons or at other times during the school day.

At lunchtime, students are free to eat their lunch in The Link while socialising with friends, play card and board games, make Lego models, join other students playing on Wii Sports or just to chat and relax.

Students with reading, spelling and numeracy issues are supported in The Link in small group timetabled lessons and at form time. A multi-sensory approach is used to develop students' confidence and to develop core literacy and numeracy skills, within a structured, well-resourced environment.

Current students, who choose to attend the Link daily, were asked what they liked about being in the resource base.



Toby, Year 7 said: "I like The Link because it's awesome. We have the Wii, get to make models and chat with our friends at lunchtime."

Leigh: "The Link has helped me with loads of stuff like homework, managing my behaviour so I get fewer detentions in class and more chances to do nice things like make models, play on the Wii and chat with my friends."

Alfie: "I have help with reading and spelling in The Link which makes learning in class easier."

Sean: "If I don't feel good, I can complete my work in The Link and use colouring therapy books to calm myself with the support of Mrs Parker."

Rebecca: "The Link has taken away the stress and anxiety I feel when I'm in school. I have core subject homework and some lesson time in The Link working on managing my anxiety. I am really excited as Mrs Parker has arranged for me to start piano lessons. I already have wobble board sessions to help manage my anxiety and join in with dance and ballet clubs at lunch and after school. I have an exit card for use in class if I cannot focus and can bring my work to

The Link to complete with support, once I've calmed down."

Nathan, Year 8: "The Link has helped because they support me in lessons; issued me a blue overlay to help reduce visual stress; homework – I get further explanations and time to complete it after school."

Rufus, Year 10: "I think that The Link has helped me a lot in the four years I've been here. It has helped me get through tests and supported me overall in many ways."















School trips excite and educate

It has been another enjoyable year for everyone involved in the geography department. As well as lots of exciting activities in the classroom, there have been trips in every year group to keep us all busy!

Year 7 – North Norfolk Coast

On Wednesday 22nd November, the whole of Year 7 visited the North Norfolk coastline at Wells and Overstrand. It gave students the opportunity to examine first-hand the power of the sea (which was very evident in November!) and to evaluate the different ways in which humans have attempted to manage it.

Year 8 – Wroxham and the Norfolk Broads

All of Year 8 visited Wroxham and the Broads during Flexible Learning Day 2 to assess how tourism and conservation are managed.

The students were blessed with some mild but dry weather, which made a great setting to take a cruise down the River Bure!

Students also had an opportunity to work independently in small groups around Wroxham, helping develop their field data gathering skills.

Year 9 – Norwich



Those students that chose to do geography at GCSE had the opportunity to visit Norwich during Curriculum Enhancement Week. During the day, students undertook some fieldwork, including examining the impact of regeneration in the Riverside

area of Norwich.

During October half-term we again visited Iceland with our Northgate counterparts. While we were there, the students had the opportunity to climb an active volcano, walk on a glacier, view some of Europe's largest waterfalls, shop in Reykjavik and, of course, walk down the Mid-Atlantic Ridge.cEach day ended with a swim in a geothermal pool, including one in the famous Blue Lagoon!

Year 10 – Holkham

In May, geography students from Year 10 spent a day in Holkham investigating sand dune succession as part of their GCSE.

Both groups were blessed with glorious weather! They have since been busy writing up their findings back in the classroom.

Year 11 – London Olympic Park

A new trip was introduced in Year 11 for GCSE to London and the Olympic Park in Stratford. Students completed fieldwork in the morning examining the impact of regeneration of Stratford. In the afternoon we visited the London Docklands museum before having a walk around Canary Wharf.

Year 9 Battlefields Trip

Our annual trip to the battlefields of the First World War took place in July and was again an overwhelming success. Over four days, pupils visited a range of sites that focussed on different areas that saw heavy fighting and looked at different battles from the First World War. Pupils focussed on the battles that raged around Ypres, explored the **Battle of the Somme** and looked at everyday life for the soldiers. During the trip, pupils laid wreaths on behalf of the school at **Langemark Cemetery, Tyne Cot** and during the **Last Post** ceremony. The hostel, tourists and members of the public commented that the pupils were a credit to the school.

Year 10 and 11 Norwich Castle Trip

The visits to **Norwich Castle** took place in November (Year 11) and July (Year 10) and proved to be hugely popular with all of the GCSE pupils. This trip helped support their **'History Around Us**' unit knowledge, looking at the changing use of the castle during its time as a royal palace, county gaol, prison and museum. Four tours were led by expert museum guides and enabled pupils to reinforce their existing understanding and learn new information.

History Club

The History Club was established this year and has enabled pupils to get more involved with history beyond the curriculum. Led by Mr Mayhew, the pupils have begun to create their own termly magazine which looks at many of their interests and informs about several lesser known historical events. One exciting project next year (in conjunction with the art department) will be making poppies similar to those on display at the Tower of London in 2014. These will be focussed on our school's local war memorial in Dereham. Pupils will be making a poppy for each man named on the memorial. They will also produce a short overview about each man. History club is open to all pupils in all year groups.







Challenging and **exciting** IT tasks

2017-18 has been a great year for the department. Minecraft, Code Club, PICO games programming and **CyberDiscovery** have been thriving! There are almost 100 active **Minecraft** seats filled every week: students can sign up for two lunchtime sessions per week. Code Club has a strong central group of coders who have been completing certificated units mainly using Python, which complements what they learn in lessons based on "Computational Thinking and Algorithms" (these units are in all year groups).

Mr Kavanagh has been running a game programming club in **PICO** every week where students can try their hand at designing and programming games with a retrofeel! These are showcased on the school website.

CyberDiscovery is an initiative run by HM Government to try and engage young people (open for 14 – 18 year olds) in the world of computer based security. There have been some very tough challenges which have been fascinating for over 50 of our students in Years 10 and 11. We had unprecedented numbers of coders get through to the third round which is an achievement that they are rightly very proud of. Keep an eye out for those few who may make it to the final stage.

This year saw the inaugural (and now annual) trip to EGX which was held in Birmingham. The trip is open to all students on both **Key Stage 4** courses that we offer in the department (GCSE Computer Science and iMedia GCSE). This was a hugely popular event (not just for staff, students enjoyed the day immensely too!). Students played all the latest games ahead of release on various platforms and also had the chance to learn from **INDIE** developers, visit the Games.biz careers fair and watch live **eSports** tournaments (which was a highlight!).





Perseverance essential for student code-breakers

Back in September we started up a problem solving club for pupils to join at lunch time. We took part in the **National Cipher Challenge** online which threw up some very challenging codes that needed breaking. Our small group of dedicated pupils persevered throughout and although we weren't always able to solve the challenges they would still look back at the solution to see what they could have done to solve it. Once the competition had finished we moved onto some more fun code breaking puzzles and evaluating the problems used in last year's curriculum enhancement week.

In March we took a team of two Year 8 and two **Year 9** pupils to take part in the **UKMT Maths Challenge**. The competition combines mathematical, communication and teamwork skills and offers pupils another way to express and develop their enjoyment of Mathematics. Considering it was the pupils' first competition they held their own, securing a fantastic 4th place up against some tough schools!

June arrived and it was time for another competition and a brand new team. This time we took four **Year 8** pupils to the **Inter-Schools Maths Quiz** at the University of East Anglia. We were up against 18 other schools and although we didn't quite finish in the top three, the pupils put in a super effort! They worked together on a variety of challenges and were even put on the spot in some individual rounds in which all of them performed brilliantly and did Neatherd proud!

Afterwards we enjoyed a sunny campus tour and a 'why go to university?' talk, which left the pupils discussing on the way home what subjects they would like to go on to study at university.

In July we were hosting our first annual **Primary Maths Quiz,** inviting **Years 5** and **6** pupils to challenge their mathematical thinking. They had to work as a team to solve a variety of tasks, including exploring the school site to collect questions and clues which will then need solving!

Finally, curriculum enhancement week saw the return of the **Enigma Challenge. Year 9** pupils spent the day cracking clues and decoding messages just like they would have at Bletchley Park. The idea for this day stems from the popular film based on true events 'The Imitation Game'.

Languages Society

Throughout the year, keen linguists have been participating in our **Languages Society** during lunchbreaks. They have watched a variety

of foreign films and taken part in competitions, in addition to learning about different celebrations and customs. For example, students painted skull window hangers to mark the Mexican "Day of the Dead" festival.

Penpals

Classes in years **7, 8 and 9** have been sending and receiving penpal letters from students in partner schools in France and Spain. The letters from the Spanish students have been very creative and students have been excited to receive them. This has been excellent practice for their written French and Spanish too.

Christmas Spanish

On the last week of school before Christmas, students of MFL celebrated the Spanish new year counting down and having 12 grapes for the minute leading up to midnight. We finished the party listening to some Spanish Christmas carols and talking about traditional activities in Spain.



Mandarin lessons

We have been very fortunate to be able to offer weekly Mandarin lessons after school during the summer term. 16 pupils from years 7 and 8 signed up to attend and have been enthusiastically practising their Mandarin with their families and friends, as well as learning a great deal about Chinese culture.

Alley Olé

In July, 24 students accompanied Ms. Collins and Ms. Batty to the Alley Olé tapas restaurant in Norwich to try some delicious tapas. The restaurant opened in the afternoon especially for our students and, as well as tasting a selection of different tapas, the students had to order in Spanish.

89 **Year 7** students were able to experience the wonderful annual Normandy trip to Château Le Kinnor in the picturesque village of Fervaques. We were hosted as always by Monsieur and Madame Lhotel (appropriate name!) and stayed for five days during Curriculum Enhancement Week. For many students, this was their first residential trip abroad and also their first time visiting France. A fun and informative time was had by all. We are very much looking forward to Normandie 2019!

To ensure our **Year 6** students are ready and willing to become enthused by science, the transition day for science was full of colour and light. Students were given the opportunity to create rainbows in a petri dish, discover the mystery substance and work out whether it was a corrosive or harmless substance. Mr Simmonds has been involved with some **Year 6** students from Garvestone and over three afternoons has enthused the students with the wonders of making crystals, chemical reactions, calculating speed and making water rockets out on the school field.



The Science Fiction Club continues to enthuse and inspire. Mrs Sheldrake with her cinephillic students are working their way through the Marvel universe, with Iron Man, Captain America and Thor proving



particularly popular. It is open to all years but **Year 7** continue to have a soft spot for the movies.

Year 8 pupils were given the fabulous opportunity during Curriculum Enhancement Week of building a rocket projectile and firing it across the sports field. Some very funky designs were created, and the most successful ones flew for over 70 metres. Year 8 were also given the opportunity to imagine life on Mars, where students watched videos and did research on the feasibility of Mars survival. Within the curriculum, students have particularly enjoyed units on critical thinking and philosophy, with the latter being introduced as a new unit this year.

Year 9 has been a challenging year which students have really risen to. At the beginning of the year, all students had an opportunity to sample a unit from GCSE religious studies in anticipation of option choices. This was clearly enjoyed by many as nearly 1 in 5 students have opted to take religious studies at GCSE. With this being the first time we have ever run the subject as a full option, we are delighted with the excitement the subject has created and we cannot wait to get started next year!

Year 10 have approached this year with a fantastic attitude! After the very difficult decision to no longer enter every student for the religious studies GCSE, 25 students have been staying after school every Tuesday to continue with the course. The dedication and effort shown has been overwhelming! The rest of the year group have continued to demonstrate a real interest in the new British values curriculum, with a focus on stereotyping, prejudice and discrimination, and community cohesion.

Year 11 were all entered into the religious studies GCSE, something which we are hugely proud of. As the final full cohort group to do the GCSE, they were outstanding. Students were so dedicated to the course, with a real desire to do well in a brand new and incredibly challenging GCSE. I am sure you will join us in wishing them well for results day. Careers



Neatherd pupils lead the way...

2017/18 was another very successful and busy year for our careers team at Neatherd. The last three years of activity survey data has shown that our students have been engaging in post-16 activity above the Norfolk average level. Come September we will also look to go through the **Career Mark** revalidation and we hope to become the first school in Norfolk to revalidate.

This year we consolidated upon our change in the apprenticeship event which we moved to take place during the school day. This meant every student in **Years 10** and **11** had the opportunity to attend. The event was incredibly successful with 30 plus providers in attendance.

We continued with our usual provision with another packed post-16 options event for our Year 11 students. We also had a number of people delivering assemblies to help support our students when making post-16 decisions. This has included the UEA, Norfolk Apprenticeships and different local employers.

All our **Year 10** students engaged in a varied **Careers Day** on one of the Flexible Learning Days. The youngsters took part in careers related activities, had the opportunity to begin their preparation for work experience and explored going onto higher education through the UEA. Students rotated around sessions from Easton College, Marsh, UEA and local apprenticeship providers.



We continue to support the **Work Experience** programme and all our **Year 10** students have returned from another successful week with local and national employers. The feedback from their placements was overwhelmingly positive; employers praised our students for their mature and committed attitude.

Our **Year 11** students were also involved in mock interviews again where representatives from local businesses come in to give each student a proper job interview in preparation for their future college interviews.

A significant development this year has been our partnership with **Network for East Anglian Collaborative Outreach (NEACO)** which has provided the school with additional funding. This has been used to purchase the Careers advice software Kudos and pay for additional workshops and other careers events.

This year's students prove **hard work** really does pay off



A gloriously sunny summer holiday came to a fitting end as our **Year 11** leavers returned to school to find out their GCSE results after a painful nine week wait. They were certainly keen to find out how they had done: by the time the doors to the gym opened at 9 o'clock, students were forming large queues outside and the majority of the year group came through within the first half an hour.

So how did they do? Did all that hard work over five years pay off?

Yes, of course it did! Their teachers had told them on countless occasions of the importance of hard work, and they clearly listened. Despite this being the second year of significant GCSE reform, with most subjects now being graded 9 to 1 instead of A* to G (a new grade 4 being roughly the equivalent of an old grade C), results were broadly in line with what teachers and students had been expecting. There were many smiles, hugs and the occasional gasp of relief as students opened their envelopes to reveal their grades.

The Class of 2018 certainly did themselves proud! Every student left the school with a good handful of GCSEs. 69% of the year group achieved grade 4 or above in both English and maths. Thirty-six students achieved grades A*-A / 7-9 in at least five subjects. An amazing 75% of students left the school with at least two GCSEs in science at grade 4 or above, whilst four students achieved the highly prestigious grade 9 in all three sciences. A great many students made exceptional progress against their challenging target grades, often overcoming significant barriers in their personal lives to do so. Our students from the Specialist Resource Base for Autism were also rewarded for their hard work, with all of them achieving at least five GCSE passes.

Well done indeed to the Class of 2018 and thank you to your parents, wider families, teachers and other members of staff who have supported you throughout your time at Neatherd. You have bright futures ahead of you and we look forward to hearing of your successes in the coming years.
