
### Congratulations

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## New Dance Academy helps to build **variety** and **diversity**

What an amazing year we've had in dance and the performing arts! This year, dance has developed at Neatherd to include various different styles such as, tap, contemporary and classical ballet. Miss Carter De Bois has created the Neatherd Dance Academy, which offers these classes to all students to help build diversity in the subject and give more variety of styles in the annual dance show at the Memorial Hall. We are also building dance back into the Year

7 curriculum to help pupils understand the basic principles of the art in preparation for GCSE.

In September, the school staged a workshop version of 'Chicago', Neatherd's first musical for over ten years with 19 very enthusiastic students from Years 9, 10 and 11. With Maisie Jessop and Luke Maxwell performing the roles of 'Roxie' and 'Billy' the show exploded on stage with everyone singing, dancing and acting as if they had been doing it for years. A brilliant effort from all staff, students and families involved!

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## Musical theatre adds **razzle dazzle** to drama

This year marked a return to musical theatre for Neatherd. Miss Dark staged an abridged workshop version of one of the darker stage and screen musicals: Chicago the '20s-set show showcased the singing, acting and dancing talent of students from all year groups and started the drama year off with much "razzle dazzle" and "ALL That Jazz"!

As one show ended, Neatherd's actors were already in rehearsal for the 2019 school production: The Golden Masque of Agamemnon. The play is an adaptation of an ancient Greek classic tale, the Orestia and is filled with blood sacrifice, revenge, madness and monsters. Trying to explain the plot twists and turns to the 90 students who turned up for auditions was a nonstarter really but they embraced the show and put their trust in directors Mrs Sanderson and Ms Costenbarder – and probably Dionysus (the Greek god of drama) – and all was well.

Adam Littleproud played the egotistical Agamemnon who, in return for the wind to send his warships to Troy, sacrificed his daughte Iphiginia. Lily Tarsey played his grief-stricken psychotic wife who avenged her daughter's death by killing her husband in league with Agamemnon's cousin, whose father had been butchered by Agamemnon's dad many years earlier - or something like that! Bradley Dack, as Orestes, was presented with the problem of avenging his father, Agamemnon's death by killing the murderer. But as this was his own mother – well that's a whole other crime . This is where the monsters come in – the Eumenedes who embraced the challenge of terrifying the audience with 100% commitment. The show was brilliant and the cast was stupendous in the energy and dedication they put into the show.

Rehearsals for next year's production have already begun for "We Will Rock You", a complete contrast to the previous 2 rather dark shows we've staged. It's a musical, building on the success of Chicago so opportunities abound for singers, dancers and actors WWRY is a fairly tongue in cheek dystopian look at what the future of music may hold and written by Brian May, has Queen's greatest hits at its heart.

The summer concert this year was again held at the Memorial Hall in Dereham, as it offers the pupils a great opportunity to perform in a professional environment. It was a fantastic evening, showcasing a wide variety of performers, musical styles, soloists and groups, many of whom were taking to the stage for the first time.

## STEM

## **Drones** and **karts** prove popular with STEM project pupils

It has been a superb year for pupils completing STEM projects. We have embarked upon all the usual STEM activities that have become a regular activity on the STEM calendar, and also completed some new projects.

## Lego League

Neatherd STEM once again secured a place at the National Final of the LEGO League. The regional competition was held at the Forum in Norwich, this was organised by Mr. Chapman with representatives from the IET (Institute of Engineering and Technology).

It was a fantastic day and the Forum as a venue added a special touch to the event.

## Drones

A number of STEM pupils have been working on a 'Drone' project. Drones are becoming increasingly popular and racing them is very competitive. The Airengineers project run by Rapid means pupils design and 3D print a drone chassis to place the motors and control system in before racing it.

It has been decided that Mr. Chapman is to assist in the building only and not the racing since he took out the air conditioning unit with one of the drones!



## **Design School**

The Design School secured funding last year and embarked on a number of out of hours design projects. We designed and "rapid prototyped" our own bike lights working with Norfolk County Council and Westcotec.

We also designed and manufactured exciting book stands for Dereham Town Library

Mr Wright's Hobbit House project has had a huge response, with pupils desperate to design and craft the house as night lights.

Gastronomy with Mr. Taylor has also been exciting with the opportunity to use different industrial processes to try out new ways of preparing food.

## Kart club

An exciting new club we have at Neatherd for 2019 is the F24 Kart club.

We have purchased a kart using funds kindly awarded by Dudgeon. The kart comes as a kit of parts, which the team has been assembling after school. The kart team members are girls and boys in years 7-10. Our kart is almost assembled and is awaiting bodywork design and manufacture. We hope to begin testing later in 2019 with the view to entering some endurance races in the summer of 2020. The kart has a 24 volt electric motor and should reach speeds approaching 30 mph!

The team will have space for some new members in September 2019. See Mr Appleby for details.





## Pupils show their skills in the game changer challenge

Food preparation and nutrition is proving to be an exciting GCSE. Pupils have been enjoying the food science investigations, understanding the functional chemical properties of ingredients. This year's cohort is the largest so far. Children also had the opportunity to be involved in a molecular gastronomy club where they explore sous vide, spherification, reverse spherification and aeration using nitrous oxide. The game changer challenge allowed students to put their skills to the test in preparing pheasants from scratch. The pupils demonstrated skills they honed at key stage three.

Results were excellent in the mock nonexamination assessments. Students in Key Stage 3 have been cooking many quality dishes with the food provided by the school. They have been making products including vegetable chilli, bread, pasta bake and pineapple upside down cake. Students are very lucky to have a beautiful cooking facility with food industry standard equipment. Having these facilities has allowed us



to make some high skill products such as choux pastry, focaccia bread and many types of pasta. We have fantastic news that some of the GCSE food students have decided to carry on their catering studies post-16.



## Fun projects for all year groups

## Year 7

This year the pupils studied paper mechanics as well as modern children's illustrators. They have been applying this to their own work by writing and making their own pop-up books. All children really enjoyed this project as it gives them so much opportunity for their own input, creativity as well as building on some key DT skills.

### Year 8

The pupils learned about digital design packages and used these to create their own 'race and chase' themed board games. They all got to grips with the 2D design package quickly and created some very exciting, as well as fun to play, games. Each child was able to design their own unique game and continue to impress with their unique and interesting ideas.

### Year 9

The Year 9 pupils have had a fantastic time this year, designing their own contemporary jewellery. They have been looking into the work of three contemporary designers and using this as the influence for their work. They have also been investigating different types of net design to create their own product packaging.

## Pupils rise to the challenge and show off their **design talents**

Years 7, 8 and 9 have been super busy being creative in materials technology this year. Year 7s have been learning to mark, measure and then construct picture frames. They have designed some great personalisation pieces for them based on the needs and wants of their client.

Year 8 have been learning about how to create accurate finger joints to be used on their phone holders. They have also learnt how to use CAD/ CAM (2D Design and the laser cutter) to create the acrylic and MDF storage parts.

Year 9 have had a new project to contend with in 2018-2019 – "Storage Tree". They are given a central pillar, they decide what they are going to store on it and use a combination of cardboard prototyping, traditional woodworking techniques and CAD/CAM to develop their unique design.

### GCSE

This was another exciting year for Key Stage 4 materials technology as the Year 11 pupils completed their coursework projects. This was the first year to see through the new GCSE specification and many pupils really excelled themselves whilst designing a variety of products to help someone with a disability. We had a number of very impressive projects from the pupils who really showed off all their broad range of skills. A few projects that really stood out were

## High quality work produced in tackling real world problems

It has been another exciting year for those pupils in Systems & Control. As well as covering the curriculum, the students have been able to apply their skills to make high quality final pieces.

### Year 7 – Vacuum Forming

Year 7 pupils used the industrial process of vacuum forming to produce the casing of their steady hand game. This production methods always get a 'Ohhhhhh' as the plastic is stretched over the mould.

### Year 8 – Mechanisms

Year 8 have been learning about the four types of motion and applying their knowledge of movement to mechanical toys. The parts for this are all laser cut by the technician and pupils then select the components they wish to assemble their project.



### Year 9 – See The Beat

Year 9 have been constructing beat detection circuits, the casing for which pupils designed using CAD CAM software and then watched the LASER cutter machine do it for them. The circuit is simple but effective and detecting the bass line of music and making LEDs flash.

### Year 10 – PICAXE

Pupils in year 10 systems have been working on a number of micro controller projects. PICAXE has proved the most favoured, with pupils developing control systems to raise flags, open garage doors and IR sender/receivers all with a circuit no bigger than a match box!

### Year 11 – NEA

The NEW GSCE Design & Technology Controlled Assessment was launched. This year, pupils have been given a wide range of possibilities in tackling real world problems.

### Inspirational teacher's award

The school was very proud that Mr Chapman, our Head of Design & Technology was awarded "Inspirational teaching of Design and Technology" for his outstanding contribution at the 19th Design and Technology Association Excellence Awards.





## Textiles

## Creative ideas flow in textiles

**Key Stage 3** pupils designed and made a range of art textiles items this year.

**Year 7** pupils made 3-dimensional fruit by developing accuracy and neatness in cutting and hand stitching.

Year 8s created either stand-alone items or contributed to an art installation in DT4. In addition to hand stitching, they designed their own fabrics using ink dying.

Some pupils created their own fabric panels using weaving. All pupils have learned embellishment techniques that have included embroidery, beading, appliqué and couching.

Year 9 pupils developed skills picked up in Year 8 and have used the sewing machines to create decorative boxes to give as gifts or

to keep for themselves. Pupils used similar techniques to those deployed by Year 8s but and also used oil pastels to design original fabric panels which



have been embellished using a range of decorative hand and machine sewing techniques.

Hopefully, pupils have picked up practical as well as art-based techniques that will broaden their artistic skills-base as well as serve them well when they have to sew on buttons and reinforce split seams.





## Vegetable garden helps promote local produce in canteen

## Sustainable Nutrition Action Group club (SNAG)

There are now four fantastic raised beds in the garden, which are all full of crops being grown to feed our excellent new canteen menu this year. The raised beds make weeding much easier and reduce water loss.

We planted a variety of different fruit trees to provide delicious fruits for years to come. All extra food produced has been made available for free at the student reception, keep an eye out to grab a tasty treat!

We had more Bake Off competitions than ever this year. The themes included Asparagus and pastry, summer spice, valentines and meat free dishes. This year the events were embedded into the house competition, meaning that all participants earnt lots of house points for their houses.

Mr Taylor in Food Technology hosted a fantastic "Game changer" event in December. Pupils successfully portioned pheasants and roasted the legs in apple, cider and rosemary and then created a cream sauce to accompany it, while the breasts were used to top garlic and herb bruschetta with a horseradish mayonnaise and crisp apple julienne.

All the pupils were extremely excited to work with game and this was the first time for most. We were really proud of the final dishes that were produced in a short time.

The new school term always begins with the celebration of **Roald Dahl Month**. We enjoyed lunchtime readings by members of staff, quotes adorning classroom doors, a form quiz and staff displaying their favourite character badges.

### **Book Buzz**

Every **Year 7** pupil was given a choice of a free book at the beginning of term - a great way to kick start their reading habit here at Neatherd!

#### We have also visited **Dereham Community**

**Library** with all our Year 7s in the summer term, showing them the wonderful array of resources available with the opportunity for them all to join Norfolk Libraries to continue their reading choices.

### **Harry Potter Night**

Each year our **'Harry Potter Night'** gets bigger and better as this year our muggles were transported through Platform 9 3/4 to a magical transformation of the library, under a floating candle sky. We were delighted to welcome a selection of live owls from **'Norfolk Wild Encounters'** that the muggles and wizards alike were able to meet and greet, and rather excitingly the evening was filmed for Bloomsbury to use as part of their promotional video for next year.

#### World Book Week (WBW)

World Book Week started with a flurry of excitement as we once again welcomed teams from primary schools to our 'Big Book Quiz'. Our literacy mentors were brilliant hosts and question masters. On Wednesday, we were amazed by an array of tempting book bakes for our popular Literary Cake Bake completion followed by a Mad Hatter Tea Party. WBD saw many staff and pupils dressed to impress in their book themed costumes and a visit from our Patron of Reading, author **Alex Scarrow**, gave an engaging presentation to all Year 7s followed by creative writing workshops. We finished the week with a visit by author Kerry Drewery who delivered an interactive 'debate' on justice for Year 9s tying in with her book series Cell7. Some students were also treated to a creative writing workshop.

#### **Enrich Trust Reading Award**

As part of the **Enrich Trust**, our libraries joined together to launch our own book award. Each librarian chose three books each for our reading groups to read. We also attended a selective informal reading group Q&A with author **Nicky Singer – The Survival Game.** The combined reading groups were a great success that will continue each term in the future.

### **Carnegie Critics**

A mixture of enthusiastic reading pupils from all year groups came together to shadow this year's **Cilip Carnegie Award**. Meeting each week in the library we discussed the shortlisted books that had been read, ate cake and picked our winner-, which for our group was **The House of Chicken Legs** by **Sophie Anderson**. This year we also hosted the **Education Library Service** celebration morning, welcoming three other shadowing schools to share our thoughts on the books. ## **The Reading Cloud**

Pupils are now able to access the school library system at school, home and on the move via their smart phone, tablet or ipod. Once signed up, they can view and reserve books, visit linked websites, write reviews, view author videos, loan e-books, read 'what next' feature based on their previous titles borrowed and much, much more including making their personalised reading avatar!

We entered two teams who thoroughly enjoyed the experience, plus our Literacy Mentors who did a fantastic job of helping run the event so smoothly.

### **Accelerated Reading Programme**

The Accelerated Reading Programme (AR) has once again proved very successful this year with all Year 7 and Year 8 pupils enrolled on the system. Teachers are able to monitor individual reading progress whilst ensuring they are choosing books within their reading ability and challenging them to read wider genres. Pupils are also now able to take their quizzes at home as soon as they have finished their book.

### **Authors**

As well as the authors during WBW we were delighted to welcome American author **Neal Shusterman** for Year 10, murder mystery author **Robin Stevens**, **Christopher William Hill** for **Year 7** and visiting **Year 6s** and **William Hussey** for **Year 8** as well as regular visits from **Alex Scarrow**.

### **Book Fairs**

This year we again held three successful **Half Price Book Fairs** in the library. For every fair held the library receives a percentage of total to spend on books for the library so thank you for supporting these fabulous events.

### **Murder in the Library**

During **Science Week** the library became a crime scene as the 'body' of the library assistant was discovered. Who was the murderer? Budding detectives were encouraged to decipher the clues, piecing together the evidence and fingerprints to solve the case.

### **FLY Festival**

Year 9 enthusiastic writers enjoyed a day at UEA as part of the Undercover Readers Celebration. Year 7 and Year 8 members of the Creative Writing Group also enjoyed a day at FLY with authors Emma Carroll, Piers Torday, SF Saidplus and Alexander Gordon Smith plus a range of creative writing workshops.

## **Visiting Theatre**

## **Reading Coaches**

## **Flexible Learning Day**

Gavin has run his own production company and has years of film production experience which he imparted to the GCSE students.

The pupils enjoyed considering the various careers that can come from studying media studies! They also explored narrative theory, camera work and scripting to create their own short film, which was designed to create specific effects in the audience.

Students had a great morning working across the year groups and learning from one another's experiences. ## Reaching the UK's top universities with a **helping hand**

## Pupils agree **support sessions** help raise their confidence

Primarily set up to provide academic support to Pupil Premium students, the Gateway has become widely recognised as a place of support for the whole school since it opened its doors six years ago, with the provision of wraparound homework and revision support. Home of the official homework club and open from 8am in the morning, the Gateway is available to all pupils before school, at break time, lunch and after school, finally closing its doors at 4.30pm. Pupils have access to laptops, a printer and support from Gateway team members. During core lesson time, the Gateway provides small group support to Pupil Premium students across the school in English and maths. For new Year 7s this could be our Secondary Ready English and maths programmes or, for Year 9, our GCSE Ready programmes. Interventions typically last 12 weeks based on 1 session per week with programmes tailored to meet the pupils' needs. Year 11 pupils, who have an adjusted curriculum, receive tuition in English, maths and science which supports their GCSE work in those subjects. The Gateway works closely with the maths, science and English departments: ensuring that students receive the most effective intervention required to 'plug the gaps' in their knowledge. The Gateway receives many positive comments from students such as: "Being in a small group means it is easier to ask questions and have

group discussions.", "It has helped boost my confidence. " and "I have thoroughly enjoyed this intervention." The Gateway prides itself on having a bright, friendly, welcoming and engaging learning environment. The team is dedicated to raising the achievements of all students and keeps a close eye on Pupil Premium pupils' progress as they advance through school.

## The JET group

Organised and run by the Gateway, the JET group (John Egging Trust) provides weekly sessions (over 10 weeks) for students who may need a bit of extra support with confidence, self-esteem and social relationship

building. The sessions include team building and leadership activities, which are all designed to make students 'think outside the box', work together and feel part of decision processes. As part of the programme, the children also take part in visits to RAF Honington where RAF colleagues put on a range of activities for them.





# ASD Base



## Activities Week a great support for our exceptional students

The SRB is the school's Specialist Resource Base for Autism, catering for 22 students from all over the county. Our 10 members of specialist staff support the students in accessing mainstream lessons as well as involving them in life skills and community activities: walking to local shops, buying ingredients and cooking, gardening and learning about money, bank accounts and businesses.

The SRB is purpose built with its own kitchen, crafts area, group area, workstations and computers.

Students based in the SRB all took part in Activities Week this year. They took part in activities such as canoeing, raft building, wall climbing, dry-slope skiing, high ropes, roller coasters and many more.

Two of our Year 10 students did brilliantly in their work experience placements – one with a Web Design Company and the other with a carpentry company.

Six of our students left to go onto their college placements, and we are pleased to welcome in six new year 7 students in September.



The Link

## Great use of free time makes The Link a **valuable asset**

Welcome to The Link, Neatherd's dedicated SEND Resource Base, which is located opposite Reception and the library at the front of the school.

Within The Link we provide support for students, both in the resource base and across the school in a variety of ways to meet their wide ranging needs.

We are open daily to students from all year groups before school from 8am, at break, lunch and after school. Homework Club with support is available until 4.30pm daily. During these times, students are able to access a wide range of resources including games, Lego, construction items, computers for homework and subject based software packages, as well as socialise. Our photographs provide an insight into the ways in which we learn within The Link, during timetabled lessons or at other times during the school day.

At lunchtime, students are free to eat their lunches in The Link whilst socialising with friends, play card and board games, make Lego models, join other students playing on Wii Sports, playing a table football match together or just to chat and relax.

Students with reading, spelling and numeracy issues are supported in The Link in small group timetabled lessons and at form time. A multi-sensory approach is used to develop students' confidence and to develop core literacy and numeracy skills, within a structured, well-resourced environment.

Current students, who choose to attend the Link daily, were asked what they liked about being in the resource base. Toby, Year 8 said: "I like The Link because it's awesome and in Year 8, we have the Link Courtyard to go in as well. We have the Wii, get to make models and chat with our friends at lunchtime."

Alfie Year 8 "I have help with reading and spelling in The Link which makes learning in class easier."

Nathan, Year 9: "The Link has helped because they support me in lessons; issued me a blue overlay to help reduce visual stress; homework – I get further explanations and time to complete it after school. Now I'm a school prefect, I support staff on duty in the Link courtyard with another Link student.'

Rufus, Year 11: "I think that The Link has helped me a lot in the five years I've been here. It has helped me get through tests and supported me overall in many ways."

Mika & Reece, 'We love the Link as we can store our things in the drawers and use our own toys in free time and help with the visiting Year 6s. We had a great time at the UEA Sports Festival too. We got medals and certificates each and tried lots of different sports which we liked especially the Messi Football.'

Kieran, Year 7:'l like completing craft activities in the Link in free time and having access to the Resource Base when I need it.'











# Geography



## Pupils enjoy educational trips







It was another thoroughly successful and rewarding year in the geography department! Dominating the calendar again this year were a wide range of field trips for all year groups:

#### Year 7 – Cromer

In November, 280 Year 7s braved the cold weather to embark on their first school trip at Neatherd! The year group were split into two, with half visiting Cromer in the morning while the others went to West Runton. After lunch the groups swapped round. At each location, pupils collected data on the impact of coastal erosion and the success of the sea defences in Cromer.

## Year 8 – Wroxham and the Norfolk Broads

All of Year 8 visited Wroxham and the Broads during Flexible Learning Day 2 to look at the impact of tourism on the region and learn about how this is managed by the Broads Authority. In Wroxham, pupils worked in small groups asking questionnaires and completing environmental quality surveys about the area. Pupils also took a cruise down the River Bure run by Broads Tours and managed to see some amazing wildlife in the spring sunshine!

#### Years 7-9 – Italy

As part of Activities Week, 47 pupils from years 7, 8 and 9 visited Italy for the week. We left very late on the Sunday evening for an early morning flight from Gatwick to Naples. During the trip, we visited Naples, climbed Mount Vesuvius, explored Pompeii, took a tour along the Amalfi coastline and visited a waterpark. The pupils had the most incredible time, learning lots of geography and eating lots of ice cream!

### Year 10 – Holkham

In March, geography pupils from Year 10 spent two days in Holkham investigating sand dune succession as part of their GCSE. Both groups were blessed with glorious weather. They have since been busy writing up their findings back in the classroom.

### Year 10 – London Olympic Park

In July, Year 10 pupils also visited London and the Olympic Park in Stratford to examine the impact of regeneration in the area. In a similar way to the Year 8 Wroxham field trip, pupils interviewed members of the public and completed environmental quality surveys. In the afternoon, we visited the London Docklands museum before having a walk around Canary Wharf.

## Medieval Norwich and First World War battlefields bring history alive

History



The department ran its first Year 7 trip to Norwich in March, which linked in with the unit pupils had completed, looking at the medieval history of the city. The pupils took part in three different activities including a tour of the cathedral, a walk taking in the medieval sites including in and around Cathedral Close along with a medieval weapons demonstration at Norwich Castle. The 280 pupils were a credit to the school in what was a busy but enjoyable day.

### Year 9 Battlefields

Our annual trip to the battlefields of the First World War took place in July and was again an overwhelming success. Over the 4 days, pupils visited a range of sites that focussed on areas that saw heavy fighting and studied battles that took place during this conflict. Pupils focussed on the battles that raged around Ypres, explored the Battle of the Somme and looked at everyday experiences of the soldiers. During the trip, pupils laid wreaths on behalf of the school at Langemarck Cemetery, Tyne Cot and during the Last Post ceremony. It was particularly poignant to see several of our pupils lay a small poppy cross at the memorials and graves of a relative. The hostel, coach driver, tourists and members of the public commented that the pupils were a credit to the school.

### Year 10 and 11 Norwich Castle

The visit to Norwich Castle took place in July and proved to be hugely popular with all of the GCSE pupils. This trip helped support their 'History Around Us' unit and focussed on the changing use of the castle in its time as a royal palace, county gaol, prison and museum. Four tours were led by museum guides and enabled pupils to reinforce their existing understanding and learn new information. Hopefully the pupils will take advantage of the free entrance voucher received at the end of the trip for a further visit!

### **History Club**



## Students becoming top code-breakers

This year we once again ran our problem-solving club for pupils to join at lunchtime. We took part in the **National Cipher Challenge** online, which, as usual, threw up some very challenging codes that needed breaking which even our maths teachers struggled to decode! Our small group of dedicated pupils still persevered throughout and although we were not always able to solve the challenges, they would still look back at the solution to see what they could have done to solve it.

Flexible Learning Day saw the return of the **Enigma Challenge** but with a twist! This time **Year 8** pupils spent the day cracking clues and decoding messages just like they would have done at Bletchley Park during WW2, they were even spread out in their own 'huts'. We had an air raid siren to signal the release of a new clue, which they then had to decipher using Morse code in order to complete the next challenge. The idea for this day stems from the popular film based on true events 'The Imitation Game'.

In March we took a team of two Year 8 and two Year 9 pupils to take part in the UKMT Maths Challenge. The competition combines mathematical, communication and teamwork skills and offers pupils another way to express and develop their enjoyment of mathematics. We went along hoping to achieve the same position if not higher than last year. The pupils did an amazing job; they were praised by other staff members for their teamwork and overall politeness. Unfortunately, we were not quite able to break into the top 3 but we did once again come an impressive 4th place!

In June we took a total of 30 **Year 7** students with us to **Toftwood Junior** to run workshops with both year 5 and 6 students based around problem solving involving time. This meant that our pupils had an insight into the life of a teacher by practising the content beforehand and then having to explain these skills in a clear and precise manner with the students in front of them. All children we took were a credit to the school and really gave it their best! Staff from Toftwood Junior were commenting on how well the pupils interacted together and how well they conducted themselves throughout the day.

Classes in **Years 7** and **10** have been exchanging letters with our partner school in France, le Collège de la Dombes, and **Years 8** and **9** have been sending and receiving penpal letters from students in our partner school in Spain, IES Poeta Caudio Rodriguez. Our students have very much looked forward to receiving these letters and it has been excellent practice for their written French and Spanish.

### Mandarin lessons

We have been very fortunate to be able to offer weekly Mandarin lessons after school

on Thursdays throughout the year. We have a small but dedicated group of pupils who have enthusiastically practised both their spoken and written Mandarin, as well as learning a great deal about Chinese culture. The pupils say that learning challenging new vocabulary has been a really enjoyable experience and lots of fun.

## Year 7 Normandy Trip - July 2019

This year, 49 **Year 7, 8** and **9** pupils went on the annual Normandy trip to Château Le Kinnor in the picturesque village of Fervaques. We were hosted as always by Monsieur and Madame L'Hotel and stayed for five days during the Activities week in July.

For some students, this was their first residential trip abroad and also their first time visiting France, and for other very keen pupils it was their second visit to the Château.

As usual, we visited the market in Deauville (and used our French to buy items for lunch), strolled around Monet's famous garden in Giverny, saw

## Marvel world inspires our intrepid science students

It's been another really busy and successful year for the science department, thanks to all the hard work of our wonderful students and excellent staff.



Year 6

To ensure our Year 6 pupils are ready and willing to make the step up to high school science, the transition days were full of colour and light. Pupils were given the opportunity to create rainbows in a petri dish and discover whether a mystery substance was harmless or corrosive. The children were also able to investigate relationships between variables and understand the importance of a valid and reliable test.

## Year 7

Mrs Sheldrake and Sci-Fi Club has been continuing to explore the science in Marvel movies. Starting the year with Guardians of the Galaxy, they looked into how cloning worked in Baby Groot (plants); whether the vibranium in Captain America's shield could exist in real life. They also found out how nuclear fusion is related to Iron Man and what artificial intelligence (like Jarvis and Ultron) has been programmed to do in 2018/2019. Thor: Ragnarok and Black Panther will be starting the club off again in September.

## Year 8

Year 8 pupils were given the fabulous opportunity during Curriculum Enhancement Week of building a rocket projectile and firing it across the sports field. Some very funky designs were created, and the most successful ones flew for over 70 metres. Year 8 were also given the opportunity to imagine life on Mars, where students watched videos and did research on the feasibility of Mars survival. They also completed a Mars lander from an assortment of materials.

## Year 9

This year Mr Covington took over the organisation for Year 9 and FLD 2 and the children completed a variety of tasks over the course of the day. They had the opportunity to develop their practical investigation and data handling skills, essential for their GCSE science course. Year 9s also completed some sampling fieldwork on Neatherd Moor. The activity went well. Only one pupil had their work stolen by a dog, and the weather was particularly agreeable. Part of the day's activities involved the School Nutrition Action Group, where students discussed the science behind ideal growing conditions, before planting seeds to grow as much food as possible. The seeds are currently being cared for by members of the SNAG club and will hopefully produce a bountiful harvest for eventual use in the canteen. All in all, a successful and productive day.

## Key Stage 4

As always these pupils worked very hard on preparing for their exams and taking part in catch up, intervention and revision sessions, which have been ongoing throughout the year.

Other highlights throughout the year have included our science clinic where pupils could get help with their science fair projects and take part in small experiments such as mini fire tornadoes, and see demos like the whoosh bottle and screaming jelly babies Of course Science Fair, which was a huge success, and we were lucky enough to have three outside judges: two research scientists from the John Innes Centre and a Doctoral student from the UEA come in and judge the quality of the projects on show. They were delighted by the exceptional effort and detailed understanding of scientific ideas and principles on show by the students.

## Interesting and creative ideas as to the **meaning of life**

As ever, it has been a busy and productive year in Society & Ethics. We have covered some great topics with all of our year groups, including some brand new units, which have been enjoyable for the children and teachers.

Year 7s studied a range of topics such as Islam, crime and punishment, money, Christianity, animal rights and mental health. Year 8s have learned about terrorism, war, families, belief in God and - the pupil's favourite- conspiracy theories. Year 9s have covered some new units on finances, British values, addiction and making ethical decisions. Year 10/11 focused on careers, addiction, sex and relationships in core S&E while GCSE Religious Studies options groups have been exploring Christianity and Islam in great depth. Overall, it has been a great examination of a whole host of social and personal issues and we've shared many interesting ideas with the pupils.

## Debating

In addition, our weekly debate club has been thriving and has grown throughout the year. Every Friday, pupils come to S&E2 to discuss big and topical issues, such as:

- Should we bring back the death penalty?
- Does God exist?
- Should assisted dying be legal?
- Is mental health more important than physical health?

We also entered the "English Speaking Union School's Mace" national debating competition. Year 10 pupils Katherine Thomas and Kayleigh Munt battled against Langley School, Norwich School for Girls and Norwich School, whose teams were made up of **Year 13** pupils. Our pupils brilliantly won the round, which was hosted at Neatherd, but were unfortunate not to get through to the regional final after coming out in the next round. However, it was still an outstanding achievement and it was the first time Neatherd have entered such a competition. We will try again next year

## The Meaning of Life

The Society & Ethics department has also been working with Toftwood Infant and Junior schools through the local cluster meetings and have inspired some of the primary school pupils to take part in a "Meaning of Life" project. Pupils submitted

## Neatherd's Career Mark revalidated

2018/19 was another very successful and busy year for our careers team at Neatherd. The last three years of activity survey data has shown that our students have been engaging in post-16 activity above the Norfolk average level. This is excellent news and reflects the work of the whole school in enabling our students to make informed choices.

We also received the excellent news that after a lot of hard work, we were revalidated with Career Mark. This is an excellent achievement and we became the first school in Norfolk to achieve the validation. The report commented that "Dereham Neatherd High School provides outstanding careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) for its students. Careers provision is well managed, coordinated and delivered across the school".

This year we again held our annual apprenticeship event which we moved to take place during the school day. This meant every student in **Years 10** and **11** had the opportunity to attend. The event was incredibly successful with over 30 providers in attendance.

We continued with our usual provision with another packed post-16 options event for our **Year 11** students. We also had a number of people delivering assemblies to help support our students when making post-16 decisions. This has included the UEA, Norfolk Apprenticeships and different local employers.

We continue to support the Work Experience programme and all of our **Year 10** students have returned from another successful week with local and national employers. The feedback from their placements was overwhelmingly positive; employers praised our students for their mature and committed attitude. Our **Year 11** students were also involved in mock interviews again where representatives from local businesses come in to give each student a proper job interview in preparation for their future college interviews.

We have also developed our relationship with the Network for East Anglian Collaborative Outreach (NEACO), which has provided the school with additional funding. The partnership has seen the funding of a motivational workshop delivered to Year 10 students and work with our literacy team. This is a partnership that is going from strength to strength.

We are extremely grateful for all the support that we receive from local businesses and organisations in helping us put together our events. The Class of 2019 achieved a fantastic set of results. Highlights included:

- 73% grade 4 or above in both English and maths (a new school record!)
- Four out of five pupils achieved a grade 4 (old grade C) or higher in English
- A similar proportion achieved a grade 4 or above in maths
- 79% of pupils left with 2 science GCSEs at grade 4 or above (another school record!)
- One in five of all exam results was at grade 7 (old grade A) or above
- 23 pupils achieved a highly prestigious grade 9 in at least one of their subjects

These results were testament to the hard work pupils put into their studies over the course of their five years at Neatherd, as well as to the expertise and commitment of their teachers and support from friends and family. Furthermore, a great many students made exceptional progress against their challenging target grades, often overcoming significant barriers in their personal lives to do so. Proof, if ever any was needed, that hard work does indeed pay off.
